Bids will be received by the Committee on streets and public property until August 11th, at 8 p. m., 1900, to furnish and deliver gravel upon the following named streets or portions thereof:  
River street from the corporate limits on the south to the intersection with First street; First street from the corporate limits on the west to the intersection with River Street; Portland road from the corporate limits on the east to the bridge crossing canyon; Meridian street from the corporate limits on the north to the intersection with First St.; Dayton road at intersection with First street in a southwesterly direction to the corporate limits; Main street from the corporate limits on the north to the intersection with Dayton road; West Chehalen road from the intersection with Main street in a northwesterly direction to the corporate limits; Fourth street with the intersection with River street and thence east two blocks and thence one block southeast on Fourth street to the intersection with Wynooki and Columbia streets.  
The bids must state the amount per cubic yard for which the party submitting the same will furnish and deliver the gravel upon each of the above named streets or portions thereof, and must be enclosed in an envelope and sealed and delivered to the street commissioner who shall open the same before the committee on streets and public property at the council room August 11, at 8 o'clock p. m. Said gravel to be put on the center of the street, and there shall be cubic yard of gravel for every nine feet of street surface in length, and as directed by the St. Com. and said gravel to be hauled and delivered and the contract completed on or before the first day of October, A. D. 1900. The expense of gravelling the intersection of said streets to be paid by the city and the remainder to be paid by the property owners whose proposed property abut upon the said streets to be gravelled. The party or parties receiving the contract will be required to enter into a contract and to give a bond for the faithful performance of the work. The committee reserves the right to reject any or all bids, and no bids will be received after the time limited herein.
