He advises that, after ripening, the beets should be sent before a second growth starts, that six of average size should be selected, each carefully wrapped in paper, and that a label should accompany them, with grower's name, and short description of the soil upon which the sample grew. If possible in this vicinity will leave samples with Jesse Edwards, they will be forwarded to the Experiment station.
