To the causal observer it would appear that there is not much of an argument in pendulums and political precedents. It ought to be pretty fairly established by this time that there never was a precedent that the United States couldn't break if she took the notion.

No better advertisement could be given for the state of Oregon than the overwhelming repudiation of Bryanism which she gave at the polls on Tuesday. In Oregon's majority for republicanism there is no sign of wavering or hesitancy. Unlike some other western states, we did not have to wait until all the backwoods precincts were heard from to know the result. To the whole country it is known that Oregon gave a decisive decision. She has fully demonstrated that she is on no backward track, but is for a brisker movement forward. In 1896 Oregon decided for McKinley with a majority of 2,000 in round numbers, while in 1900 it will reach 15,000. These figures tell a story which needs no comment.

In assuming the responsibilities of directing the affairs of government in these, the opening years of the problems relating to our policy of expansion, the republican party fully appreciates the moment of its self imposed task. It realizes that grave problems are to be met and settled, and that in the face of crafty opposition both at home and abroad. It furthermore realizes that the paths are new and untried. But strengthened by the consciousness of a history of notable performance, it has welcomed the idea of new responsibility, and has appealed to American voters to declare in favor of American capability and integrity. The answer has been overwhelming, and, though appreciative of the fact that mistakes will doubtless be made, the administration can be depended upon to uphold in every way the honor and integrity of the Republic, the true ideals of American government, and to justify the great degree of confidence and trust manifested by "the voice of the people" as spoken last Tuesday.

ELECTION SUMMARIES.

The democrats concede President McKinley's re-election with 289 electoral votes, or 65 more than necessary to elect, while the republicans think his vote will probably reach the 300 mark. At all events it is a landslide, and since the re-election of Grant over Greeley, no national committee's forecasts have been so nearly fulfilled as those made by the republican national committee in this campaign. So far as can be determined, the result by states is as follows:

New York, republican by 146,000. Odell was elected governor by about the same majority, and the republicans gained some congressmen. Indiana, republican by 30,000, with 11 of 13 congressmen. Legislature republican. Illinois, republican by 100,000. Yates elected governor by 75,000. Idaho, probably republican by 3,000. Ohio, republican by 80,000. Nebraska is in doubt with chances in favor of a small republican plurality. Connecticut, republican by 28,415. Massachusetts, republican by 83,000. Colorado, fusion by 35,000. Utah, republican, majority unknown. Maryland, republican by 14,146. Pennsylvania, republican by 300,000. New Jersey, republican by 50,000. Minnesota, heavily republican on national ticket, but governorship in doubt. North Dakota, republican by 10,000. South Dakota, republican, probably by 10,000, with republican legislature to elect successor to Pettigrew. Kentucky in doubt with chances in small favor of the democrats. Montana, democratic by 17,000 with prospects bright for Clark's re-election to U. S. Senate. Kansas, republican by 25,000. Delaware closely republican. Nevada, democratic, by 1500. California, republican by 40,000. Iowa, republican by 100,000. Michigan, republican by 75,000. Wisconsin, republican, 100,000. West Virginia, republican by 17,000. Washington, republican by safe majority for national ticket. Rogers, fusion, probably re-elected governor. Oregon, republican by 15,000. New England for McKinley by old time majorities. Solid South for Bryan with just any kind of majorities.
