During the month of October, the Newberg Creamery paid for butter fat 22cts. per lb. which is the same as creameries of Salem paid, and within one half a cent as much is the leading creameries of Portland paid. Dairymen can see that prices compare favorably with other sections, and should feel hopeful and encouraged for the future of our creamery. Let us all send in all the milk and cream we can this winter, as the more there is, the more we will get per lb. for butter fat. If the output of the creamery was three times what it is, the expense would not be much more than it is now. It would not cost but a small amount more than one third as much to make a lb. of butter. We have the advantage of creameries in the large cities, as our rent is cheaper, wood is cheaper and we are located nearer the dairy district. Then if our Newberg creamery is well patronized, as it should be, and I think will be in the future, it can pay as much, or more for butter fat, than any creamery in the State. A PATRON.
