"The Farmers Short Course" will be held at the State Agricultural College, at Corvallis, January 8 to February 2 inclusive. Many questions of interest to farmers, fruit growers and dairymen will be discussed and the attendance ought to be large.

The census returns show that the center of population in the United States is twenty miles this side of where it was ten years ago, indicating that Empire is still coursing westward, though with a decreasing rate of speed. The center of population in 1900 is located at Columbus, Indiana.

If some member of the Yamhill delegation will introduce and cause to be passed by the legislature a bill prohibiting the sale of cigarettes in the state of Oregon, he will receive the thanks of a very large constituency. No boy ought to be allowed to smoke the vile things and the public is entitled to protection from being compelled to inhale the stink as it is puffed about in public places.

Congressman Tongue in a speech at the ratification at Hillsboro, sounded the key note from the republican standpoint when he said that it is prosperity that tries men's souls, not adversity; that the future success of the party depends on whether or not we seek to keep the party in power by maneuvers, or whether we lose sight of that and only look to promoting the best interests of the country. With such able and conservative men as Mr. Tongue as national legislators, there is not much doubt as to which course will be pursued.

It is to be hoped that the great powers, in dealing with China will not display the temper of a Colorado mob and wildly pursue the bloody track of cold revenge and persecution, but will bring to bear the strong arm of dignified retribution, teaching the government and people of China the enormity of their offense against civilization and the friendly nations of the earth, forcing them to pay a heavy penalty for their crimes and to give an unequivocal guarantee against future violations of international comity. Nations of advanced civilization and Christian teaching cannot afford to descend to savage levels even in dealing with savages, and the hope is that the cool, conservative policy of which President McKinley is now the principal champion, will prevail in settling with the Oriental Empire.—Statesman.

The optimistic air castles which the old line democrats are building relative to the resurrection of Democracy are ruthlessly snatched by Bryan's cheerfulness assurance that he is in politics to stay. And when it is considered that he is a young man, of discouragingly good health and fine physique, with an unquestioned abundance of ego and self-assurance, it would seem that he has the bulge on the old liners who have grown gray in the democratic harness. It should also be considered that possession always counts nine points in the case, and that Bryan enjoys the possession of that fraction of the democratic party to date. Two old leaders can meet and reorganize to a finish, but as long as Mr. Bryan can point with pride to the rank and file of Democracy as "my personal following," he can snap his fingers at the reorganizers and live to fight another battle. It's truly a strenuous condition which the democrats are up against and all the more an interesting one from the impartial standpoint of outsiders.
