The "Reclamation of arid America" is the text of a wholesale lot of literature now being sown broadcast over the country by the National Irrigation Association. As the government is appropriating vast sums of money for the opening up of foreign markets and the development of foreign trade, and spending freely on river and harbor improvements, it would seem that the next step would be to prepare greater room for our increasing population, here at home.

The kind of American expansion which is worrying England just now is the expansion of American trade in competition with her own commercial interests right at home. She is much more alarmed over this phase of the matter than any phase of American territorial aggression, as she has cause to be.

In our great prosperity we must guard against the dangers it invites in extravagance in government expenditures and appropriations, and the chosen representatives of the people will, I doubt not, furnish an example in their legislation of that wise economy which, in a season of plenty, husbands for the future.

With all the boasted chivalry, it looks like the South would have to assure one in favor of the mercenary North from a political standpoint. The situation before the country, briefly, is, we are growing so fast in population, that in order to keep the lower house of congress down to a size suitable to a practical working basis, the apportionment ratio of representation will have to be cut down.

great industry here have been employed during recent years in selling their properties and business to new combinations controlled by themselves and in cheapening their products by various economies in buying supplies, selling goods and getting rid of cutthroat competition.

He says the consolidation of business interests in great corporations is now the established rule, but the subject is never discussed by the press except where there is an opportunity for a sharp thrust at American protection. A member of the industrial commission, who visited Europe for the purpose of making an investigation in regard to trade combinations, found that they are numerous in England and increasing. Such facts dispose of the claim that they are the offspring of protection.

By a large majority the American people rejected this democratic view and the protective policy will be maintained. Meanwhile the republican party will find a way to deal with the combinations that will not be disastrous to American industries and labor.—Omaha Bee.
