A Grand Rally to the Support of Pacific College.

A few of those most deeply interested in the welfare of Pacific College, have of late been studying the financial situation very seriously, with a view towards arriving at some plan for lifting the debt from that institution. Others were consulted, and the first step, as a result of those deliberations, was the inviting of the business men of Newberg to meet in the Friends church Monday evening, for the purpose of having placed clearly before them the critical financial condition of the college. The invitation was very generally accepted, though not as much so, as it is believed it will be a little later.

The meeting was led in prayer by Rev. Barr, after which Jesse Edwards, president of the board called upon President McGrew to speak upon the "Relation of Pacific College to our town from a moral and educational standpoint." He began by declaring his belief in his subject and that the college was the chief factor in the upbuilding of the community. He quoted Horace Greeley's saying, "The one structure which no neighborhood can do without is the schoolhouse," taking that as his text.

Prof. J. C. Hodson spoke very pertinently of the relation of the college to the business interests of the town, to this effect: An average of 80 pupils brings in \$200 a year which makes a total of \$16 000. A very low estimate would give it that 10 families are here for the sake of the college alone, and that they bring in \$4000 more, annually, making a grand total of \$20 000. This divided among 40 business men means \$500 a year. Can they afford to lose it? Some say that the public school will educate our children. The college has made the public school, and if it should go down this year, there would be one less teacher in the public school next year and two less the next, and it would rapidly become a very second rate school. The relation to property owners, house and hall renters, is very close. If Pacific College should close its doors, half of us would move away and the other half would go bankrupt. The college must be placed upon a better basis, and the responsibility is upon all of us.

The financial situation was given by Rev. Barr. The debt to be raised is \$13,000, with enough notes on hand to cover \$1000, leaving \$12 000 to be raised. The amount of interest now being paid will contribute largely towards the running expenses, if this amount can be raised. It is proposed to raise \$6000 of it in Oregon, and now in Newberg is the time and place to begin. The contract was then read, stating conditions under which subscriptions were to be made, and a response called for with the result that \$1900 was raised. Considering the number present it shows a very good beginning, and the Board is encouraged for the effort to be put forth. Public meetings will be held soon, and every body given a chance to rally to the standard of Pacific College.

At the close of the meeting, the company was invited over into the Endeavor room where refreshments were served, and all enjoyed a social hour, the last before the arrival of the new century in discussing the welfare of the college. Pres. McGrew suggested that it could not be ushered in more fittingly than by such an effort in behalf of such a cause.

The contract which is being signed by subscribers reads as follows: "Believing the indebtedness of Pacific College is a hindrance to its work, I hereby agree to pay—dollars, to help liquidate said debt, on the following conditions: 1st, this subscription shall be void unless the sum of \$12 000 shall be subscribed or donated by July 1, 1901. 2nd, This subscription to be placed in the hands of three business men; of Newberg (outside of the Board of Managers of Pacific College) who shall certify to the amount subscribed or donated. 3rd, If the amount so certified shall equal or exceed the sum of \$12 000 Pacific College shall notify me (either verbally or in writing) by August 1, 1901, then this subscription shall be due and payable October 15, 1901." C. K. Spaulding, W. C. Kridger and Clarence Batt have been chosen as the committee of business men referred to in the above.

Before aid is to be asked from the East, it is expected that half the amount will be raised in Oregon, apportioned roughly by the board as follows: Newberg and vicinity \$4000, Oregon Yearly Meeting, exclusive of Newberg \$1000, and the alumni of the college, \$1600.
