THE LOCAL ORATORICAL.

Minchin, the Freshman, Takes the Audience by Storm and Wins First Place.

Much had been looked for from our college orators this year, as a result of the training of a special instructor, but when the seven orators had finished last Friday evening it was the common verdict of the large audience which had breathlessly listened to them, that they had surpassed the fondest expectations. The contest was a surprise to everybody. It was easily the best ever held here and those who have been in the habit of attending the state contests do not hesitate in classing this above them, in the high standard maintained. There were no poor orators or "fill ins," and every speaker was worthy of college honors. As one in the audience ejaculated, when one contestant had finished, "That is grand," and yet six orators, in the decision of the judges, went above that contestant.

The enthusiastic oratorical spirit showed itself in the magnificent audience present. Every reserved seat had been sold early in the evening, and a third more could have been. The hall was filled to its full seating capacity, affording the orators a potent source of inspiration. And more than this the attention throughout was remarkable. Seven long orations were listened to with scarcely a stir in the whole audience. In this, the orators received an unconscious and an unusual tribute.

The exercises of the evening began considerably before scheduled time. The two competitive aggregations the Seniors and Sophomores on one side and the Juniors and Freshmen on the other had been seated across the aisle from each other, and proceeded early to make the air delicious with strenuous vocal exercises such as is known only on such occasions. It was all greatly enjoyed by the audience as a necessary adjunct, however, and especially as some of the spectators were on to some of the signals and jokes such as "alls well" etc. A business man afterward remarked that he could see a great improvement over past years in the yelling as well as in the standard of oratory, the expression of which sentiment will doubtless fully repay certain fair Freshmen for efforts so strenuously put forth in this direction.

Before calling the program, Prof. Kellogg, who presided, made a few remarks relative to the spirit and intent of the occasion, and in eulogy of the spirit which the students had put into the work. Before the result was known he said he wished to speak hopefully of our place in the state contest and entered a word for the support of Pacific College at Corvallis on the evening of March 8. After the invocation by Rev. Barr, the program was called as given below.

The judges of the contest were as follows: One thought and composition, Pres. S. E. L. Penrose of Whitman College, Walla Walla, Washington, Prof. A. R. Sweetser of Pacific University, and Prof. D. M. Metzger of Dallas Academy; on delivery Dr. Wilson, principal of the Portland Academy, Prof. R. H. Thomas principal of the Clifton Kelly school, Portland, and Attorney King Wilson, also of the metropolis. All are men of ability and sound judgment and their decision was vociferously applauded, in the announcement of Elwood Minchin as having taken first place, Nervia Wright took second, while Clara Newby and Lucy Gause tied for third place.

Seldom indeed has an audience been so well pleased at a decision. Young Minchin's oration on Phillips, was a masterpiece and his oratory was nothing less than soul thrilling. The arrangement and organization of his subject matter is admirable. After his first climax, the young orator had his audience hanging on every word. Near his conclusion his hearers unconsciously leaned forward, and after the fast word had been spoken remained silent and spell bound for very awe and admiration. But when the applause did come it was tumultuous. We believe that Mr. Minchin is by all odds the best orator the college has ever had and with a square set of judges, Pacific College has a good lead for first place in the state contest.

March 8. The students, and citizens as well should rally to his support and they need have no fear of P. C.'s rank this year. The highest and most telling tribute was given by Dr. Wilson, whom he said to be a member of the faculty that he had attended some of our state contests, and any which he had witnessed would in his estimation have ranked third in comparison to our local contest. From such a recognized authority this is certainly encouraging. Farther than this he said he had noticed in most oratorical contests, that the style of oratory was not practical, and would have to be unlearned in real work. He spoke of the work shown here as an exception and strongly commended the training given by Prof. Kellogg. Considering that he has had to work from the very bottom this year, the results of Prof. Kellogg's work are remarkable, and the public appreciates the worth of his services. The friends of the college are looking forward to the state oratorical with a new enthusiasm this year as a result of Friday evening's work. Let it continue from now till March 8. The rallying cry of the next three weeks should be one and the same—"On to Corvallis."
