Launer was a minister in the Evangelical church, and was sixty-nine years of age.

When he left home forty-eight years ago there were living his parents, three sisters and five brothers, but all are now deceased except two brothers, both of whom are older than himself. Persons who were born since he came into this community now have grandchildren of considerable size.

In speaking of the removal of Rev. Brouillette and family to Newberg and their five years of service and more performed at Gervias, the Star says: "During this time the church has increased wonderfully in membership, and he was instrumental in adding 94 persons to membership in his several places of worship. The church building and parsonage have been greatly improved, largely at his own expense. Mrs. Brouillette has been an active worker in church affairs and has done much valuable and conscientious service in all branches of the church work, and is for the second time President of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Presbytery, of Oregon."

Detective Ford came up from Portland on Wednesday evening and with the assistance of marshal Woods arrested W. D. Lewis on a charge of murder. Ford went to Portland on Wednesday morning with the prisoner where he will be given a preliminary hearing. A murder was committed on the East side last winter and the detectives claim to have some evidence against Lewis but on going to press the Graphic is unable to get the details. Mr. Lewis moved to Newberg from Portland something more than a year ago and remained several months, then moved back to Portland. About two months ago he again moved up with his family, but Mrs. Lewis soon returned to the city to work, leaving Mr. Lewis and the little girl here. They have been living a mile west of town.

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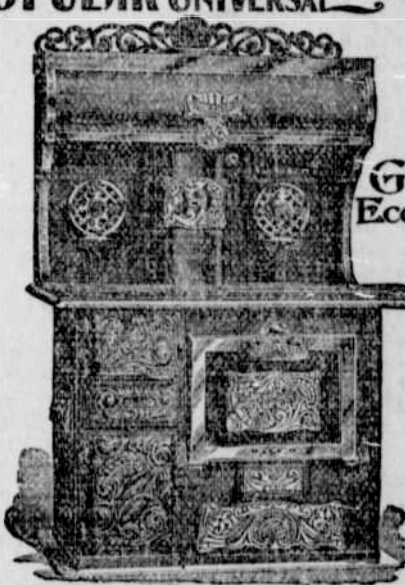
