On last Friday evening at Craters hall the Willamette Lodge No. 96, I. O. O. F., and the Vesta Rebekah Lodge No. 76, celebrated the 82nd anniversary of Odd Fellowship, members of the local orders and invited guests being present. Very interesting and appropriate commemorative exercises were held, interspersed with good instrumental and vocal music by Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Robertson, Mrs. W. F. Nelson, Miss Eleanor Satchwell, Mr. F. H. Storey and Mr. L. E. Holt, after which all present dined the right thing by a sumptuously prepared banquet.

In the local field day sports of the University of Oregon held at Eugene last Saturday, Roy Heister broke the Northwest record in the pole vault, clearing the pole at 11 feet, 2½ inches. He also won the one hundred, and two hundred and twenty yard dashes, both hurdle races, and the running broad jump, thus winning five of the six events in which he entered, and tying for second place in the high jump, the sixth event. The question arises, what would our state institutions do, in spite of heavy state appropriations, without Newberg to draw upon for athletic material for advertising purposes?

Hon. J. C. Nelson showed us an interesting paper the other day, upon which, with the exception of two years, 1864 and 1884, was a record of all the county taxes he has paid into the treasury of old Yamhill, since his first arrival into the land of promise, with the names of the sheriffs to whom the taxes were paid. The first entry is that of 1848, when his taxes amounted to \$1.25 were paid to sheriff J. G. Baker. From that time to the present he has paid to the various sheriffs of the county nearly four thousand dollars, which makes a record, than which in all probability not many Yamhill farmers can show a better.

There are more wonders in nature right here in Yamhill county than were ever dreamed of. The latest discovery, made a few days ago, was a petrified egg picked up by B. F. Wright on the railroad near town. It is egg-shaped, very hard and heavy, and is a little smaller than a goose egg. Mr. A. J. Howell believes it to have originally been an egg. He will take it to a lapidary in Portland and have it sawed through as a means of determining its substance. The Southern Pacific company, upon whose premises the ancient egg was found, being unable to find anything but garden soil in this county, is forced to haul for long distances gravel for ballasting. It is therefore unlikely that we can claim the petrified egg as a home production.—Reporter.
