He writes that they are of the Chautauqua variety, which he has now had in his garden two years without any traces of mildew. If this variety maintains its freedom from mildew it will prove decidedly valuable, as all other varieties which produce such large berries of which we have any knowledge are subject to mildew. There are some seasons in which the mildew can be kept in check, but the most faithful work seems to be of little avail in other years in the case of the large English varieties.—Oregon Agriculturist.
