Since the drive got down from the upper streams into the open river, fortune has favored the navigators and unusual progress has been made down the river. As an exchange from a town up the river says, it is no small feat to successfully navigate such an enormous raft as this and do it economically. Few people appreciate the size of such a log drive. Eight million feet of lumber, or logs, represents about 40 full freight trains of 28 cars each loaded to their full capacity. This drive represents the full year's labor of a large force of men and a considerable capital of the promoter, who must pay his men as he goes along and wait until the end of the year when he gets his logs to market for his money. The whole represents an honest and sturdy type of labor which is at the fountain head of the great lumber industry of Oregon, and which is doing so much to develop the state and gives it an international reputation as a lumber producing state.

The family of Thomas Jones living north of town has been passing through very sore trials lately. The second daughter Nettie was taken down with fever three weeks ago and is still in a very low condition, though the attending physician thinks if no further complications arise she will get well. A few days ago Mrs. Jones began to complain of slight illness but she thought with a little rest she would recover. As she did not rally as was expected the doctor was called and it was pronounced a case of inflammatory rheumatism. This was followed rapidly by erysipelas and the patient died on Tuesday evening.

The deceased, Mrs. Katie Guthrie Jones, was born in Calumet, Wisconsin, October 27, 1860 and was married to Thomas Jones at Watertown, Wisconsin, 1878. Later they lived in South Dakota and in Minnesota before removing to Oregon about two years ago.

Mrs. Jones was an affectionate and devoted wife and mother and in her death she leaves a husband and six children to mourn her loss.

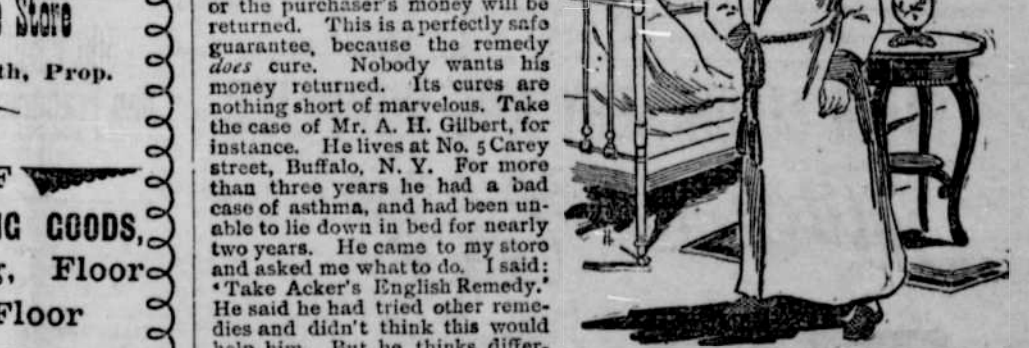
