The widow and one grown son survive the deceased.

Hon. E. L. Smith, of Hood River, who was the life of the state horticultural meeting held here in August, gives some convincing testimony in favor of the policy of spraying. He gathered 520 boxes of apples in his lower orchard of 4-year-old trees—trees that had been set three years, says the Hood River Glacier. In the 520 boxes he found less than one boxful of wormy apples. Across the ravine from this orchard a neighbor picked 100 boxes from trees of the same age. The neighbor did not spray his trees, and about two-thirds of his apples are wormy. This is a very convincing object lesson to the neighbor and next year, it is hardly necessary to say, he will spray. Mr. Smith sprayed his orchard six times during the season. He feels very much encouraged over his success with his new spray pump and is satisfied he knows how to get the best of the codlin moth.
