APPORTIONING STATE TAX. Yamhill County's Share Under the New Law—The Percentage Plan. There is a falling off in the value of assessable property in Yamhill county this year of \$38,472 as compared with the assessment of last year. It is noticeable, however, that there is a corresponding increase in the valuation of the taxable property of every other county in the state that has been equalized by the respective county boards, the increase in Multnomah county alone reaching the sum of \$15,924,277. This increase signifies one of two things. Either greater prosperity has overcome the balance of the state and overlooked this county, or else the new law in reference to the apportionment of the state tax has made it possible to confirm the suspicion that the majority of counties in the state have purposely been making a ridiculously low valuation in order to escape payment of their just share of the state tax burden.
