CLOTHES MAKE THEM SICK.

Philippine Savages Do Not Take Kindly to Sartorial Adornment. Our soldiers in the Philippines have observed recently that the savages there who have adopted civilized clothing have suffered in their general health. The wearing of a high silk hat, for example, has produced brain trouble, while even the strain of wearing pyjamas has caused serious nervous disorders. So serious have been the results in some cases that the physicians sent out to care for the soldiers have mentioned the new dangers in their reports.

The United States troops in Guam and in Samoa have in one way and another distributed considerable clothing among the natives. In many cases the natives who had gone naked all their lives were dressed up in smart suits to make them presentable as servants. The sudden wrapping of their bodies enfeebled them. In many cases their system soon showed the effects and they fell a prey to lung and pulmonary diseases. Before the coming of the white men these diseases had been practically unknown in these regions.

The introduction of the Mother Hubbard wrapper for women by the missionaries in the South Pacific has also had a very serious effect upon the general health of whole tribes of natives. A still more remarkable instance of the ill effects of civilized clothing upon people unused to it has been observed in the case of the Japanese. The haste which they have made to adopt Western civilization is said to have had a national debilitating effect. As prominent an authority as Prof. Starr, of the University of Chicago, states that the Japanese as a nation are suffering from brain troubles as the result of too much dressing.

Japan, as all the world knows, was a barbarian country fifty years ago, compared with America. The awakening of the Japanese nation did not come until the Chinese-Japanese war. Since then Japan has progressed with leaps and bounds. The case of her soldiers and their choice of uniforms is put forward as an example of the injurious effect of too much clothing. Thousands of men accustomed to the light Oriental garb have adopted the heavy uniforms of the German army, even to the great Hessian boots. As a direct result the general health of the army has suffered.—Los Angeles Times.

BITS FOR BOOKWORMS

Mrs. Humphrey Ward is writing an introduction to a book entitled "The Case for the Factory Acts," which will be published soon. The volume is the work of several writers, and deals with social and economic problems of factory life.

Critics are still disputing as to the authorship of the now famous article in the Quarterly Review on Queen Victoria. Max O'Rell asserts that it was written by Lady Ponsonby. But the Sphere of London states that it has "the very best authority" for denying any such assertion. In this connection another writer now recalls that Sir Walter Scott once denied the authorship of the Waverley novels.

"A Maid of Venice," F. Marion Crawford's new novel, has for its period the end of the fifteenth century, when the queen of the Adriatic was nearing the time of its greatest splendor. The romantic episode with which the story deals is historically true, being taken from one of the old Venetian chronicles. The action and interest center in the household of a master glass-blower, a member of one of the most powerful Venetian trade corporations, which had many rights and privileges.

M. Ostrogorski's important work on "Democracy and the Organization of Political Parties," has been translated and will be published in the course of a few weeks. The author does not deal with the externals of democratic government, but with the real forces which are its motive power, and which make it what it is. He describes the general political life of England and America in the State and in society. M. Ostrogorski also gives a systematic history of party organization in England and the United States.

Maxim Gorky, the new literary star of Russia, is being rapidly introduced to English readers. Gorky's story, "Foma Godyeff," which has been described as passionately lyric as well as powerfully dramatic, is, in effect, a picture of the merchant class in Eastern Russia, who make their living on the River Volga. It is regarded as the strongest, the most typical, work which Gorky has yet produced. As for himself and his strange, ragged career, it would seem that he has not lost his head in the license which St. Petersburg is burning about him.

The quantity of beer absorbed in 1900 amounted to 1,289,766,000 gallons, or not much less than 208,000,000 cubic feet; in other words, the contents of a reservoir 2,000 feet long, 1,000 feet wide and 104 feet deep.
