Yamhill's Poultry Show.
The Western Oregon Poultry and Pet Stock Association held its first annual fair in McMinnville the first of the week and from all reports was a great success. The following notes in regard to it are gathered from a good wiretap given in the Telephone-Register.
In all there were about 200 chickens on exhibition, every first-class breed being represented. The representation was not confined to McMinnville and vicinity, but every part of the county sent birds to the exhibit. It is this healthy interest which insures the success of the association now in its infancy.
The fair was held in the old postoffice building and was an interesting scene of activity during the three days session. Chickens which were seemingly aware of their fine blood and proud of the same, strutted in coops piled one upon the other around the entire circuit of the building, taxing it to its capacity. The interior of the drech was usually well-filled with interested spectators who were lavish in their expressions of admiration of the various breeds, and their approval of this, the initial movement of the association. Coops of large, slow-moving Plymouth Rocks and Brahmas were arranged along side trim-built, proud Games or Leghorns giving a variety that could not but gratify everyone's taste for well bred chickens.

The birds were judged by W. W. Browning, of Ogden, Utah, an experienced and competent judge, who will act in the same capacity at the state exhibit in Portland. The local association is to be congratulated upon securing the services of Mr. Browning.
The interest taken in the fair by the people of Yamhill county and the west side in general shows that the breeding of blooded stock is becoming a feature of our agricultural life. It was noticeable that a large proportion of the fowls at the fair were entered by farmers. Our people are beginning to realize that a first-class chicken is just as valuable in its sphere as a first-class grade of wheat in the manufacture of flour. With these things in mind, the date of the organization of the Western Oregon Poultry and Pet Stock Association may be recorded as a date of progress in the livestock industry of the state.
