A PUBLIC CREMATION. Amid General Rejoicing the Mortgage on Pacific College Goes Up In Flames.

Since last July, when it was announced that enough money had been subscribed to raise the debt from Pacific College, the time has been generally looked forward to with eagerness when enough money should have been paid to liquidate the indebtedness and secure the release of the mortgage.

B. C. Miles, president of the Board, presided. In opening the exercises, he remarked that some had said yes and some no, in regard to the possibility of lifting the debt, and that he wished to call on Rev. Barr for a few words as a man who had always said yes.

Rev. Barr on arising remarked that he noticed that the audience present was somewhat larger than the one which had gathered a year before when it had been announced that the debt was to be raised. While the general spirit manifested by the people has been that of encouragement and helpfulness, Rev. Barr paid a tribute to the faithful few who have stood at the helm through times of adversity and distress, and borne the brunt of the work and self-sacrifice.

Seth Mills, financial agent of the college, gave a few interesting statistics. Since July he has received in cash \$14,324.18 on the college indebtedness. Of the subscriptions made, all has been paid but \$341, which he considered a remarkable showing.

Jose Edwards said he claimed as much credit as anyone for making the debt, but was not sorry for it and was glad it was paid. The mortgage was a

necessity at the time given and the board was justified in its course, the only means of keeping the doors of the college open at the time.

A song had been arranged for the occasion, and to the tune of "Marching Through Georgia," was sung with a will by the students.

While we are marching through college. Prof. Kelsey spoke in a few words from the text "Pinck wins; it always wins," and called for three cheers for Pres. McGrew, who had done the most towards lifting the debt, but who was physically unable to be present at the celebration.

Mr. Miles suggested that the higher power and aid should not be forgotten and led in a prayer of thanksgiving. Then, accompanied by college yells on the part of the students, Mr. Miles one by one consigned the old notes which had been held against the college, to the flames. The scroll note, on which the mortgage served as security, was saved until the last, when Mr. Edwards was called up and allowed to apply the flames to the paper which had caused such labor and anxiety.

The audience rose and sang the doxology and the meeting adjourned, with three cheers for Rev. Barr and three cheers for the college board given by the college students. The celebration closed with a big bonfire on the college campus.
