The prohibition brethren will meet in convention in Newberg today and nominate a candidate for congress for the first congressional district. Circulars have been sent out to each individual member of the party urging them to attend, in order to get one hundred voters present so they can get the name of the nominee placed on the ticket. A. J. Hunsaker, the nominee for governor, and other big guns are expected to be present.
