Statue of the Indian Maiden Who Figures in a Pathetic Legend.
There will soon be erected in Central Park, at Winona, Minn., a splendid fountain, the most prominent feature of which will be a bronze figure of a maiden representing the beautiful Indian girl after whom the city was named. The statue is the work of Miss Isabel Moore Kimball, an Iowa girl. It will stand on a base of forty feet in diameter, making it one of the largest in the country.

The name of Winona is associated with one of the prettiest of Indian legends. Winona, or Weconah, as it is called by some, is a beautiful young girl of the Sioux tribe. She was desperately in love with a handsome young Sioux, who was a hunter and a brave. Her parents wished her to wed a warrior of another tribe. Finding that her protests were in vain, she ran away from the parental house. The warrior who had been chosen by her parents to be her husband pursued her toward the father of waters, and the maiden, seeing that escape was impossible, climbed to the top of "Maiden Rock," and leaping into the great stream beneath, was seen no more. This rock is a landmark on the western shore of Lake Pepin, which is merely an enlargement of the Mississippi River, between St. Paul and Winona.

In Miss Kimball's statue the girl is represented as standing upon the rock, ready for the fatal leap. With her right hand she shields her eyes from the sun, while taking a last look at the land she loves so well, while in the other hands she grasped tightly her bow and arrows. She is clad in a dress of deer-skin and her feet are encased in moccasins. For ornaments she wears a necklace of shells and wampum. Her wealth of hair is combed straight back, reaching to the waist in a double braid.
