Inaugural Address of Mayor N. C. Christensen Delivered Before the City Council. In accepting the office of mayor of the city of Newberg, I wish to say that I appreciate the confidence of her citizens, and shall endeavor to serve to the best of my ability, seeking to promote the interests and prosperity of our thriving little city, and the general welfare of the people.

I do not suppose that it is the intention of this council to attempt any radical changes in the administration of the city affairs. The reputation which we have already gained, as a place of high moral standing and enterprise, can only be maintained by the continuance and enforcement of laws which suppress evils and encourage the right, and by improving every opportunity to add to our industries.

Our predecessors are to be commended for advancements made and for the good financial condition which we find our city in today, with over \$1900 in the treasury and practically no unpaid warrants against us.

Besides the general work of street improvement, new walks, etc., there are advancements which suggest themselves to me and which I think are worthy of our consideration. Whether we shall be able to carry out these suggestions may be questioned.

One practical need of the city is a sewerage system, to improve the sanitary conditions and to attract prospective citizens. This would mean no small cost, but the outlay would be offset by the enhanced value of property alone, and we would be ahead in the important feature of improved health conditions.

A ferry across the Willamette at the boat landing would do much toward increasing the business of our city. If an arrangement giving free ferryage to the people who bring their produce from across the river and secure their supplies in Newberg, could be agreed upon by the business men, I believe this could be made a source of revenue to the business interests of our city, at once.

Finally, it should be our aim to be awake to all the interests of the people and to administer the affairs of the city so as to secure the greatest public good in morals, in health and in finances. To this end I pledge my best efforts.
