It is said that an injury to the tongue is repaired by nature with more rapidity than in the case with any other part of the system. So much encouragement for the politicians.

United States Senator Jones of Arkansas, who has managed the last two national democratic campaigns, has suffered defeat in his home primaries, in his effort for re-election. One by one the Bryan enthusiasts are "going away back."

Norwegian legislators propose that girls who do not know how to knit, sew, wash and cook should be refused permission to marry. If such legislation were general, the question "Is marriage a failure?"—might not be such a chestnut, divorces might be less frequent, and more worthless husbands supported.

It is a decidedly narrow type of statesmanship which is more or less in evidence in Eastern states, which would cut off appropriations for improving rivers and harbors, simply because some of the inland states don't get a rake-off on the proposition. Like some politicians, certain commonwealths seem to consider that the words of the constitution "general welfare," have no application away from home.

The very fact that Hanna is seriously considered as a candidate for presidential honors, is evidence of the great change of sentiment throughout the country in regard to him both as a man and as a politician. Though maligned and cartooned as belonging to some lower order in the human family, he bided his time, and is living down gross misrepresentation. The general attitude toward him is being readjusted and he is becoming one of the strong men among the common people.

The record of Hon. Thos. H. Tongue, enthusiastically re-nominated for congress, is the best eulogy that can be given him. The editorial expression of Wednesday's Oregonian is worth repeating, especially as the Oregonian has ever been conservative in its support of Mr. Tongue. "Representative Tongue's hold upon the people of his district and the ability of his service at Washington were signally attested yesterday by his unanimous re-nomination at the Roseburg convention. Few seats in Congress are more ably and intelligently filled than the one from the First Oregon District."

The status of the re-organized (?) democracy is pretty well set forth as follows by the Globe-Democrat: Hill opposes Bryan, and virtually promises to fight him if he should be nominated in 1904. Bryan will take the stump against Hill if the New Yorker should be made the candidate. Gorman, it is said, will oppose either one of these if either gets the nomination, while it is pretty well known that Bryan is almost as hostile to Gorman as he is to Hill. Each one of these three persons represents a powerful element of the democracy. Of course, these three ambitious persons do not constitute the whole of the implacable ones. There are several other leaders who have as variegated a list of antagonisms. On the surface of things, it would appear as if the democratic presidential candidacy for 1904 would have few attractions for any one who wants to have a political future, yet the chances are that there will be a struggle for the nomination, and that the man who is selected will accept. The present indications, however, are that the contest will be one-sided, as was that of 1900.

NATIONAL CAPITAL CORRESPONDENCE.

At last we have spring and the world has revived with grass and the green buds to prove it.

An amusing incident that occurred the White House lately will interest Oregonians. Mr. Tongue had accompanied two Oregon ladies, Mrs. Werner Breyman, of Salem, and her sister, Mrs. White of Yamhill, and our friend Jeff Myers was in the company. President Roosevelt was very polite and they had about finished the audience, when one of the ladies remarked that they had crossed the plains in an early day with ox teams. The President seemed fairly electrified at hearing this. "Now, that's something worth the while! By George! Just to think of that! Here are ladies that crossed the continent as pioneers in the early times! Why," he continued, "I had rather see these ladies and hear the story of crossing the plains than to see almost any man alive!" Jeff Myers thought he might come in on the pioneer layout, so he gently in-

timated that his parents crossed about the time that Whitman did, but that was not satisfying to the strenuous one, who said he thought much more of the people who did things worth the while than he did of their children. Then he gave some western reminiscences of his own, talked of the general character of the western people. Some way the talk changed so that he told of killing his first buffalo. They were driving some Texas steers—"stogies," that were all horns and tail," when a buffalo bull left the herd he was with to join the stogies they were driving, so he killed him. The ladies had quite a unique experience to occur at the White House.

Senator Mitchell has furnished a statement as to matters now pending that interest Oregon. The Chinese Exclusion bill, introduced by him and known as the Mitchell-Kahn bill, has been reported favorably from the Committee on Immigration; is now on the Senate calendar and may be made unfinished business to come in after the Anarchist bill, or immediately after the Oleomargarine bill; he thinks it will be reached within two weeks.

The Nicaragua bill—the House Hepburn bill—is reported favorably from Committee on Isthmian Canals, without amendment, and will be made unfinished business after the Anarchist bill, the Chinese Exclusion bill and the Oleomargarine bill are disposed of.

The Nicaragua bill will lead to long discussion. The Isthmian Canal Committee are divided, those in favor being Morgan of Ala., Mitchell of Or., Turner of Wash., Platt of N. Y., Hawley of Conn., Foster of La. and Harris of Kansas. Those opposed are Hanna of Ohio, Kittredge of S. D., Prichard of N. C. and Millard of Neb. These four favor the Panama route and the purchase of the old Panama plant from the New Panama Canal Co., by paying forty million dollars. The majority believe it a bad bargain if the Panama interest was to be had for nothing, as the proper route is by Nicaragua.

The Indian War Veterans bill and Oleomargarine bill have both passed the Senate and the last is reported favorably in the House, as also the Irrigation bill. Besides these Mr. Tongue gives the figures that interest Oregon in the River and Harbor bill. The appropriation practically doubles any amount appropriated heretofore, making a total of almost two millions: Tillamook \$27,000, Coos \$10,000, Columbia at Cascades \$30,000, Upper Columbia and Snake \$38,000, Willamette and Columbia rivers below Portland \$225,000, Coquille \$30,000, Coos river \$25,000, Siuslaw \$26,000, Mouth of Columbia \$1,500,000, Lower Willamette \$38,000, Upper Willamette and tributaries \$68,000. The total lacks a few dollars of two millions. It is true that the immediate appropriation for mouth of Columbia is \$500,000, but there is another million subject to the order of the Secretary of War at any time he may consider it necessary. In this Oregon interests have received all that can be reasonably asked.

At the present time there are quite a number of visiting Oregonians in the city. Mr. Richard Nixon and Mrs. Nixon arrived from Portland Sunday evening; Mrs. Nixon's mother, Mrs. J. N. Dolph, had been here all winter. Mrs. Werner Breyman, of Salem, and her sister Mrs. White, of Yamhill, are spending some time here. Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Myers, also from Salem, will remain here some while longer. The presence of so many Oregon people makes it pleasant for an Oregonian resident here who recognizes them as friends.

Build up the Creamery.

The Newberg Creamery has now been running over three years and there has been no time that there was not hope for its advancement. But the prospects were never better than at the present time for Newberg to have as good a creamery as there is in the state. During the month of March last there was fifty per cent more butter made than during March of any of the previous years. The butter sold for more on the market than it has done during the history of the creamery, and the patrons received more for butter fat.

Butter is on the decline now the principal reason being that California butter is coming into Portland. Oregon ought to produce all the butter that is used in the state but it seems she don't at the present time. We can certainly produce butter as cheap as California can produce it and pay the freight to Oregon.

As has been stated time and again there is no place that can equal the Willamette valley for dairying. We have the natural home for the vetch and clover and can raise other crops too numerous to mention that are good for the dairy cows.

One important advantage we have in this section is that of both river and rail, as freight is generally higher where there is no competition. With all the advantages that we have Chehalis is sure to be a dairy section and that means more cows, more and better barns, better farms and more money. Dairying will bring in the cash every month and that is what we all like.

Send your milk to the creamery no matter how little. If you have no way of sending it to us let us know. We want to start a wagon on the road hauling milk and cream in the near future and all that are intending to send in milk or cream call at the creamery and we will see what can be done.
