It is the intention of the directors to begin agitation at once among the fruit growers and endeavor to persuade the latter to dispose of their small fruits such as cherries and berries through the association, that the latter may be placed upon a substantial working basis as soon as possible. This is a progressive move which should receive every encouragement.

It is a rather deplorable fact that the nomination for one public position, which means or should mean so much to the neighborhood, and which is the most important of any from a local standpoint, that of road supervisor, should go almost a begging.
