Indian War Veterans.

At an adjourned meeting of the Indian War Veterans of 1855-56, held at Independence, August 16, 1902, the following proceedings were had:

On motion of Major James Bruce, of Benton county, Ben Hayden was chosen chairman.

On motion of James Hays, of Corvallis, J. R. Cooper, of Independence, was chosen secretary.

On motion of Major Bruce, the secretary was instructed to communicate with all the county clerks within the state and ascertain the number of Indian War veterans and their dependent widows in their respective counties and report the same to the Adjutant General at Salem.

On motion of D. L. Hedges, the secretary was instructed to transmit a copy of these proceedings to all the newspapers within the state with request to publish the same.

On motion the meeting adjourned to meet at Salem, Wednesday, October 1, 1902, and all Indian War Veterans are cordially invited to attend.
