First in the Field.

The complete edition of Yamhill county's advertising pamphlet has been issued and as indicated in the letter from W. E. Coman of the Southern Pacific, published below, Yamhill is the first county of the Northwest to get all its advertising matter on distribution. The McMinnville board of trade committee has retained ten thousand copies for county distribution, allotment to be made to the different localities in proportion to the funds furnished. When in the county seat last Friday a representative of the Graphic was kindly furnished with several copies of the souvenir, which is found to be well arranged and a comprehensive statement of the resources and attractions of the county, and fairly representative of all localities. It is embellished with numerous illustrations, this end of the county being represented by views of the Dundee prune district, one of A. C. Churchill's prune orchards in full bloom, a scene at the oil well, Pacific College, and the interior of the Newberg creamery.

It is worthy of note that the highly attractive and appropriate design on the first page of the pamphlet was executed by an eighteen year old Yamhill county lad in the person of Fred Cooper, son of J. C. Cooper, who is now at work with his pencil in San Francisco at a good salary.

The letter which follows is self explanatory.

Portland, Or., Sept., 17, '02.
Mr. J. C. Cooper, Chairman advertising committee, McMinnville, Oregon.

Dear Sir:—Irwin-Hodson delivered us yesterday three boxes of your pamphlets, which I forwarded to Chicago by passenger train, and understand the balance will be delivered to us during the next few days. We will place them in Mr. McKinney's hands at the earliest possible moment, and your complete edition, with the addition of 20,000 issued by Salem, will probably be all that Mr. McKinney will receive for the next two or three weeks, so that Yamhill county will secure through this medium representation throughout the middle states and the East such as no other country or community in the Northwest will have, possibly, during the season of low rates this month and next.

I wish to compliment your people on the pamphlet you have gotten up, which is replete with the right kind of information, presented in a concise and attractive form, and which I believe will compare favorably with any advertising matter of this nature that is being issued. McMinnville and Yamhill county should have the banner in this matter, as, while Salem got their first edition of 20,000 into Mr. McKinney's hands a few days earlier, yours is the first complete lot issued by any community in the Northwest. I have heard it said in the past that the Willamette Valley was somewhat slow compared with other sections of the Northwest, but if there yet remains any such idea as this, the action of your people in this matter of advertising literature certainly disproves any such opinion.

Thanking you and your people for their hearty co-operation in this work, and assuring you that it will be no fault of the Harriman interests if Yamhill county does not reap a rich reward, I beg to remain, yours very truly,
