After an illness of three or four weeks from acute dysentery, Reuben Everest, one of Yamhill county's pioneers, died on Thursday evening of last week at his home east of town. The funeral services were conducted at the home Saturday morning at ten o'clock by Rev. F. C. Stansard, interment being made in the Everest cemetery. The deceased was born in Kent county, England, November 26, 1834, and came to America with his parents in 1836. In 1847 he founded the family across the plains to Oregon, settling on the place east of town. The deceased was married in 1863 to Mrs. Elizabeth Parrett who died in 1873 and two years later he was united in marriage to Jane Hask. To the first union seven children were born and to the second six. Ten children are living, and all were at the bedside of their dying father. Mr. Everest served his state in the Indian wars of 1855. In his death the community loses an upright and honorable citizen.

He took a post graduate course, and graduated in Jefferson Medical College, of Philadelphia, in March 1877. Since that time he has taken a course on diseases of children in the Chicago Post-graduate Medical College, and a general post-graduate course in the medical department of the Southern California University of Los Angeles, during the winter of 1901-2, giving special attention to the diseases of children. He has done a general practice two years in Tennessee, ten years in Iowa, three years in Indian Territory in government service, two years in Alaska at the Duncan mission, and three years in Oregon, two of which were at the Hot Lake resort in Eastern Oregon.
