From the testimony of Sam the only witness, he and the Indian, Billy Miller by name, had been drinking heavily, which was not the most improbable thing that could be imagined.

The jury found that the deceased came to his death from the excessive use of intoxicants and from exposure to a double barreled verdict such as was once given by a jury of colored gentlemen who "sat upon" the body of a man washed up on the banks of a river, and who found after due deliberation that the deceased had "drowned in de ribber and washed ashore and frita to death."

From the best that can be learned, Miller, who came here last June, hailed from Seattle, where he claimed to have relatives. He was probably about thirty-five years old and bore scars that indicated a strenuous life.

A Big Fraternal Blow Out.
