There is evidently an increasing interest in fine poultry raising and this is what the officers of the association wish to encourage. The day has passed when scrub chickens are "good enough" for anybody.

Geo. W. Downs of Portland, the veteran chicken fancier, acted as judge of the show and gave the best of satisfaction. He is conscientiously painstaking and marked very closely. The birds were judged Wednesday, for the most part, and the result will appear in next week's Graphic.
