The people of Oregon rise and thank Governor Chamberlain for his veto of the Newport summer normal bill. The bill meant an appropriation of five thousand dollars just for a starter, an entering wedge as it were, and the Newport school would doubtless have eventually blossomed out into a full-fledged "Oregon State Normal," tapping the state treasury annually for a fat appropriation. The proposition looked to the governor like a "summer excursion" and he said no. The people have accordingly put down one big mark to the credit of Governor Chamberlain.

Senator Fulton amply proved his staying qualities, and rather to the general surprise after so long a fight, forced the opposition to him at the last moment, and is now United States Senator Fulton, of Oregon. The choice is a good one and the general feeling is that an able man could not have been selected to co-operate with Senator Mitchell in the interests of the state. From a party standpoint, Mr. Fulton really deserves the honor. Being in the prime of a vigorous manhood, he has many years of good service before him and can reasonably look forward to a successful career.

Representative Landis of Indiana is opposed to placing the statue of George Rogers Clark in the national capitol by the people of his state. He holds that the statue of some man whose life and achievements were identified with Indiana should share with that of Oliver P. Morton the illustrious company in Statuary Hall. Mr. Landis is certainly a little near sighted. In all the annals of American history there is nothing more heroic than the historic march from Kaskaskia, of Clark and his little band of followers across a wilderness country, all the time imperiled by floods and threatened with starvation, to Vincennes, which with the state was wrested from the English control. Was this achievement not identified with Indiana history? Had it not been for the genius and indomitable energy of George Rogers Clark, one of the greatest factors in the Nation's building, we might have a very different story of Indiana and adjoining states. Mr. Landis should refrain from an occasional flight of oratory and post himself on Hoosier history.

The good roads meeting held in Newberg last Friday, while not as widely attended as it might have been, showed that there are some wide-awake people in this community, who are interested in securing better public highways. It indicated too that something is going to be done toward the desired end. The meeting was a beginner and the Graphic believes that something good will result. The results following the construction of good roads are well illustrated in the case of a certain town in Indiana which some years ago was noted for its poor roads. In this county two towns were rivals, both being equally distant from a fine agricultural section. In order to get the inland trade one of these towns conceived the idea of building one mile of good road a year toward that section. The first year one mile of road was built, and so obvious were the results that three more miles were at once built by private subscription. Travel and trade increased in a large volume, and the next year seven miles of good hard road appeared. Today almost all the roads leading into the town are improved. Indeed it is an important trading center for the farmers. The rival town is practically dead. The moral is plain—good roads pay.

Condensed Milk Factory.
 The Times gives the following description of the factory which has recently been put in operation at Forest Grove: Active work commenced Tuesday at the condensed milk factory. Word had been sent out a few days previously that they would be ready to receive milk on that day and at an early hour it began to come in. Wagons well filled came from all directions and up to the noon hour there was a con-

stant succession of them coming up to be unloaded. A shipment of seven cans from Reelville came by express. The wagons drive onto a platform on the south side of the building where the cans are taken out. The name of the party sending the milk is entered in a book, the milk dumped into a receiving can and weighed and it is then run into a big tank under the floor. The milk cans are washed and scalded by steam as fast as emptied, and put back into the wagon that brought them so it can drive away without delay. From the receiving vat the milk runs into the two big copper kettles or tanks in the basement. There it is heated by steam and when sufficiently cooked is drawn by suction into the big vacuum tank on the main floor. This is the condenser proper. Here it is cooked by steam in vacuum until condensed to the proper consistency, then it is drawn into cans which are placed in the big troughs in the basement covered with water and agitated by the cog wheels that have been a source of so much speculation to the visitors there. When cooled the cans are hoisted on an elevator and run into the north room where the cream is run into the little cans and sealed as it appears in market. It is not yet finished, however, but is again heated in these cans and finally taken to the storage room where it "matures" until ready for market.
