The March number of the Oregon Teachers Monthly shows the enterprise of its management in presenting short sketches and pictures of all the members and officials of the last legislature, making it an interesting and valuable edition for reference. The tacking of tin and paper placards upon the electric light and telephone poles in this city should be prohibited. They give the poles a very unsightly appearance and they are also an inconvenience and a danger to the linemen carrying on their work, for the signs are liable to cause the linemen's creepers to slip and thus give him a dangerous fall. In the larger, progressive towns of the state the poles are kept free from signs and other unsightly things and the poles are required to be kept neatly painted, thus precluding their looking like a row of dead trees by a country roadside, disfigured by storms and the glaring signs of patent medicine and barn storm shows.—Medford Success.

The temperance cause has received a strong ally from an unexpected quarter says an exchange. Employers of labor are becoming aware that they cannot secure the best service from a man who is addicted to the use of alcoholic stimulants, and the number of lines of business in which habitual drinkers will not be employed is constantly growing larger. The last business enterprise to advocate total abstinence among its employees is the liquor business itself. Brooklyn has a bartenders' temperance society, with 600 members. Now a bartenders' and saloonkeepers' total abstinence society has been organized in Chicago. Each member of the society will wear a blue ribbon. The bartenders have been forced into this action, as many of the saloon keepers refuse to employ men who drink. It is stated that one-third of the bartenders and saloon keepers in Chicago are total abstainers. It is found that a drinking man is of no use even the liquor business itself. This action on the part of the liquor men is significant. They are in position to know the evil effects of the business as no one else is, and their action should be a convincing argument against it.

This lets Newberg out. When the place suggested the new comer asks when he can reach it. He is told that he must go out one evening and stay over a day and two nights, to see any of the country. That settles it with him unless he is particularly interested in the town. You need a better train service—a morning train out of Portland. The present service is inadequate and you are losing immigrants every day." We have the goods here but it is beyond us to carry the people here to see them. The people of Newberg feel that the same advantages should be given them by the Southern Pacific which are accorded other places. The patronage of this place justly demands it.
