The nomination of Hermann sounds good to the Graphic. In fact, it could not have been made any more to its liking.

The Capital Journal remarks that the Oregonian fought Hermann and Brownell, with the usual result. One presided over the convention and the other is the nominee.

From January 1, 1902, to March 31, 1903, forty-four thousand people have come to Oregon, of which one thousand are credited to Yamhill county. The state has begun its real growth.

State Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey is making a record in starting a crusade against 12 and 13-ounce butter to the pound. Hon. Binger Hermann, of Roseburg, was nominated by the republican convention, held at Eugene on Thursday of last week, for congressman for the first congressional district, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Tongue. The contest was a hot one, but since Mr. Hermann won out, the defeated candidates are accepting the result with good grace and are already falling into line to work for the success of the ticket. Mr. Hermann represented Oregon in congress for several consecutive terms, beginning in the early eighties, and he was one of the most active workers Oregon has ever sent to Washington. He got good places on committees, and he had a faculty for getting the things he went after in the way of appropriations that became proverbial. With his long years of experience at the capital, he will go to the front again much more quickly than a new man could hope to do, and the republicans of the first district made no mistake when they gave him the nomination. Binger is a good campaigner, and when the votes are counted it will be found that Mr. Reames, the democratic nominee, spent his time and money in vain.
