Our democratic friends do a good deal of talking about their "fighting chance" for electing a congressman from the First District, but when it is considered that to win, their man, Reames, must get over eleven hundred votes more than Governor Chamberlain got against Furnish, even to them the next congressman must look a good deal like the Hon. Binger Hermann.

Whatever its idiosyncracies may be, the people of Oregon have just cause to be proud of the Oregonian, a journal without its peer on the Pacific Coast. Its editorial page, of which last Sunday's edition is a good sample, has not its superior in any journal in the whole country. The general realization of this fact gives the Oregonian the national prestige it deserves.

The results of Saturday's work show that the idea of making Newberg a better and cleaner town has taken hold of the people. So far so good. The motto now set before our citizens should be, "Keep at it." One day's work will not amount to very much. For the desired results we must have persevering and unanimous effort. It is the purpose of the Board of Trade to guide and oversee the work put forth in this direction, but the co-operation of the citizens is the important factor. Let the good work go on.

An Indiana engineer has made a calculation in regard to the money saved by good roads. He estimates that the cost of moving one ton of horse-power over one mile of dry, sandy road is 64 cents; over wet sand, 32 cents; over ruts and mud, 36 cents; over broken stone ruts, 26 cents; over an earth road that is dry and hard, 18 cents; over a broken stone road in good condition, 8 cents; over a common gravel road, 6.8 cents; over stone paving, 6.33 cents; over asphalt, 2.7 cents. The engineer argues that if a wagon transportation at a cost of 5 cents per mile per ton could be general, many millions of dollars would be saved, and millions of tons of merchandise, which cannot now be handled at a profit, would be available.

One good turn deserves another and often suggests it. It is now suggested that a house-painting association be formed in Newberg; that an agreement be entered into by property owners to paint their buildings on the condition that a certain number of signers be secured. The idea is as good as it is original, and two

or three have already stated a wish to sign a paper on such a proposition. Few investments are better than paint for a town. The other evening, as the train passed through Newberg, two Portland ladies, on looking from the car window toward the college and down Meridian street, were overheard to remark on the clean, white appearance of the houses. If the impression was not dispelled before the train pulled through Newberg, those ladies will have a pleasant remembrance of this place, and on occasion will speak a good word accordingly. Better an humble-looking cottage well painted than a more pretentious residence done in yellow ochre or guiltless of color altogether.

The officers of the Board of Trade would appreciate a larger attendance at its public meetings on the part of the business men of the town. Some seem to hold the view that individual responsibility was ended when the officers of the board were elected, when in reality it is only begun. Four or five men can't do the things which the people of Newberg want done. All should stand ready for active service. And another thing has been noticed and remarked upon. The officers of the city of Newberg, who are supposed to have the interests of the town continually in mind, often say they would appreciate helpful suggestions as to city affairs as it is hard for them to know the will and desires of the people, and yet, with the exception of Mayor Christenson, no city official was present at either of the last two meetings of the Board of Trade; and on both occasions municipal affairs were discussed in a way that every councilman should have heard. It looks like it would be in order for the Board of Trade to change its time of meeting from the third to the first Monday evening of each month and hold its sessions in the council rooms.

### Value of Deep Breathing.

Every inch added to the chest means more vitality. One can live for days without food or water; without air, one will die in a moment. This shows the great necessity of oxygen to the system. Remember, also, that oxygen burns away fat.

Here is a breathing exercise that can be practiced during the daily walk. Inhale, filling the

lungs, while walking five steps; hold the breath during the next five steps; exhale, completely emptying the lungs, during the next five steps. Now inhale during six steps; hold the breath the next six; exhale during six more. Continue the exercise, increasing the number of steps each time. After a few weeks you can use fifteen steps.

Try to breathe deeply at all times—that is, make both inhalations and exhalations longer in time. Do not breathe with the abdomen, as most fleshy people do, as this increases its size. Use the diaphragm or lower chest in breathing.—Harper's Bazar.

### An Oregon Corn Field.

Southern Oregon will have this year a corn field that would be a credit to the great corn-growing states of the Union, for this field will contain 240 acres, which is probably the largest acreage on one farm in Southern Oregon ever planted to corn. This record-breaking corn will be on Capt. Gordon Voorhies' Eden Valley orchard farm. The work of plowing this big field was completed last week, the foreman, J. Huger, having had 14 teams to do the job, and now so soon as the ground is a little warmer planting will begin. The object in planting such a large corn field was not so much the profit in the corn as it was to have a crop on the ground that had to be cultivated, for the entire 240 acres is in apple and pear trees, planted last season and this season, and they need to be well cultivated, while some small crop, such as corn or potatoes, can be grown upon the ground without retarding the growth of the trees.—Medford Success.
