hall.

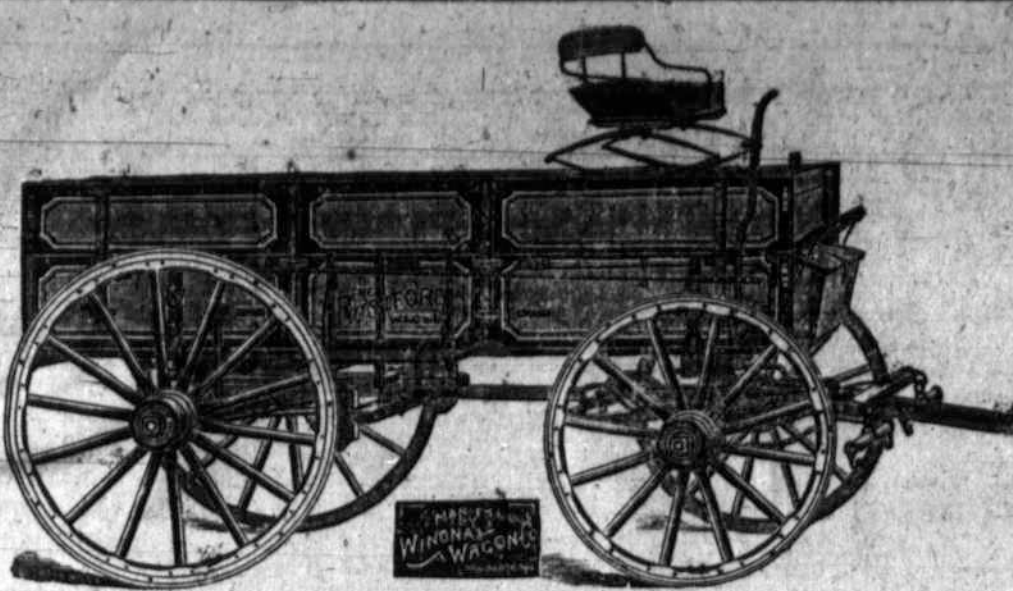
The work of clearing up the
