It is authoritatively stated that there is sixty dollars in Kansas for every man, woman and child. In other words, the "per capita" of which we used to hear so much from that quarter is traveling skyward. Though the Kansans did not take kindly to the pungent and apt advice of William Allen White, given in his Emporia Gazette when populism was booming, nevertheless they seem to be acting upon it and "raising more corn and less hell."

Secretary Root, endorsing the dismissal of Cadet T. Berry from West Point for false statements made in connection with his detection in the possession of cigarettes, has written a brief homily which others beside West Point cadets could take to heart with advantage. The secretary says: "The defendant in this case attempted a fraudulent evasion of the truth and succeeded in telling only a plain and stupid lie. If he had succeeded he would have been equally guilty, for the truth is a matter of substance and not of form. The truth or falsity of a statement is to be measured by the meaning which the speaker knows the hearer ascribes to the words. The quibbling and attempts at disingenuous subtlety by which the young men, of whom this defendant was one, sought to conceal their practice of cigarette smoking would seem to be more natural to a police court than to a company of officers and gentlemen."

"Cutting off your nose to spite your face" is a very old and very homely expression, which would seem exactly to apply to the proposed action of the federated trades of Portland to invoke the referendum and kill the 1905 fair project. Because their employers' business would profit by the holding of the big exposition, the members of the trades unions take the stand they do. They do not blush in confessing that this is the basis of their kick. How blind is mortal man when his passions are once fully aroused! Who will derive more direct and immediate benefit from the fair than the workingman? In this day of complex industrialism the plan of "knocking" and boycotting is getting to be a difficult proposition. It is like the action of a two-edged sword, with the edges multiplied and a boomerang combined. You may hurt the fellow for whom you have whetted your steel, but you are pretty sure at the same time to draw blood on your friends and inflict an ugly wound upon yourself. But we do not believe the unions will persist in their folly. When passions cool, they will think carefully before dealing such a body blow to the Lewis and Clark Centennial and to the best interests of the state of Oregon.
