of locating in this vicinity.

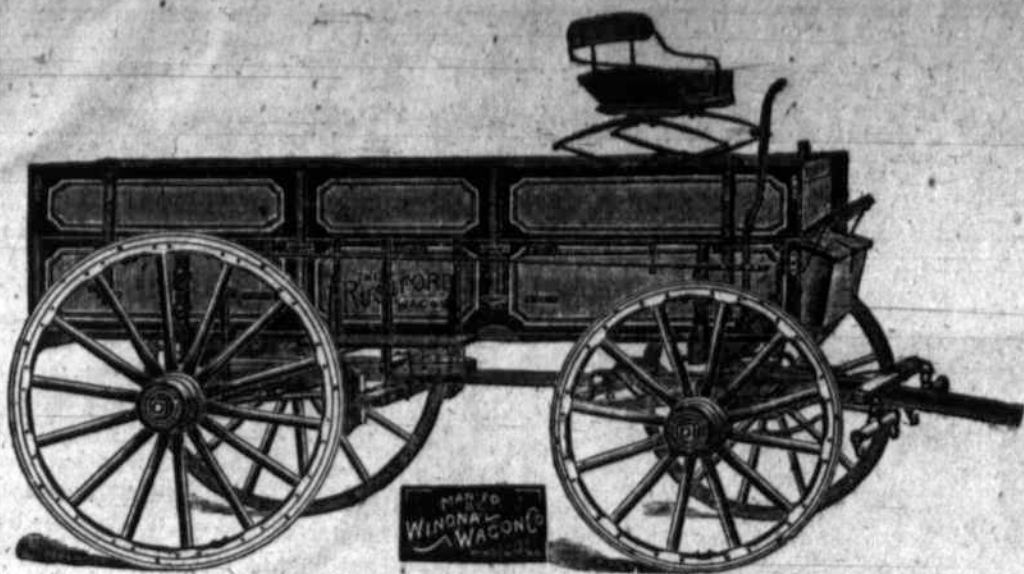
The democratic congressional
