A Big Concern.

The material used in the construction of wheels is all prepared in hot oil. It requires sixteen stationary engines, with a combined capacity of 2500 horse power, to operate the 1019 machines in daily use.

The aggregate length of belt is over eight miles, and more than 2500 men are required to produce the 75,000 vehicles for which they have an annual capacity. There is the largest plant of its kind in the world, and their vehicles are extensively used in every civilized country on this earth.

The company has a very extensive general agency in Portland, under the supervision of Mr. E. M. Brannick, a retired army officer, who manages the business with as much skill and exactness as he once maneuvered his men in front of an alert enemy.
