MORE DRAFT HORSES ARE NEEDED.

Not only is there a great and increasing demand for good driving horses, but there also exists such a demand for good draft animals. The standard of horses kept in the Willamette Valley has been greatly raised within the last few years. There was a time when an arrival from the East or Middle West took immediate notice of the raw-boned plugs which were driven and worked out here, and while some such animals still do service here, as everywhere, we have horses we are not ashamed for anybody to see. More pride is taken in good horseflesh, and the result is obvious. This applies

more generally to driving animals, however, and he who starts out to buy a good draft team will seek long and arduously before his search is rewarded.

In view of the good demand for draft horses it is rather remarkable, says the Agriculturist, how hard it is to learn of any one who makes a specialty of breeding such horses in this part of the world. A recent inquiry came to this paper for the names of breeders of heavy horses in Oregon and Washington. An examination of all the agricultural and live stock papers published in the two states disclosed but one advertiser of draft horses. Something is wrong. There ought to be more breeders, or, if there are enough, they should make themselves known.

When the Willamette Valley is covered with a network of electric railroads so that farmers will not need to make long drives, heavy horses will be the rule on the farms. Farm work calls for heavier horses in Western Oregon than on more easily worked soils of the Middle West. The demand for heavy draft horses in the cities on the Pacific Coast grows rapidly; and buyers find it hard work now to secure enough such horses to meet the requirements of purchasers.

The Era of the Buttercup.

Oregon meadows and hillsides are spangled with millions of buttercups. Their petals are as glossy as the surface of a mirror of gold, varnished with a polish beyond the power of human art to copy.

The children have a tradition saying that if the buttercup's yellow glow is reflected clearly when held under your chin you have a fondness for butter, and the glow on Oregon meadows indicates that this is a butter state.

Half a billion kine are cropping the tender green and sweep into their capacious maws the grass and buttercups mingled together, adding the richer tinge and fatter flow of milk and cream.

The dairies are swelling their output, and the streams of cream wagons are growing into lengthening processions from day to day until the height of the dairy season is reached.

This is the season of cream, and the oncoming crops of Oregon strawberries will soon demand all the increased supply that would otherwise swamp the markets.

The strawberry comes in the nick of time to save the butter market, and the millions of white bloom form an army of fruit-builders, storing acid, flavor and color to tempt the human palate and complete the round of consumption.

Thus are industry and health builded upon the buttercup and the strawberry bloom, and the wheels of commerce turn on a golden axis and fields of snow-white blooms are the background of bank accounts.—Capital Journal.

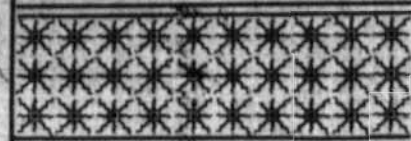

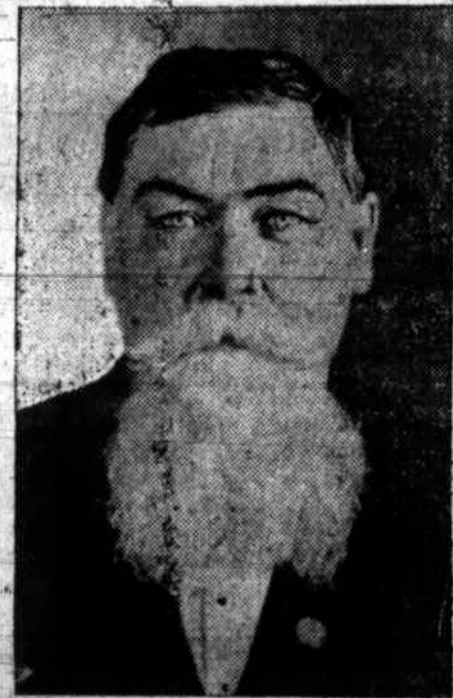
