tensively in the Old World.

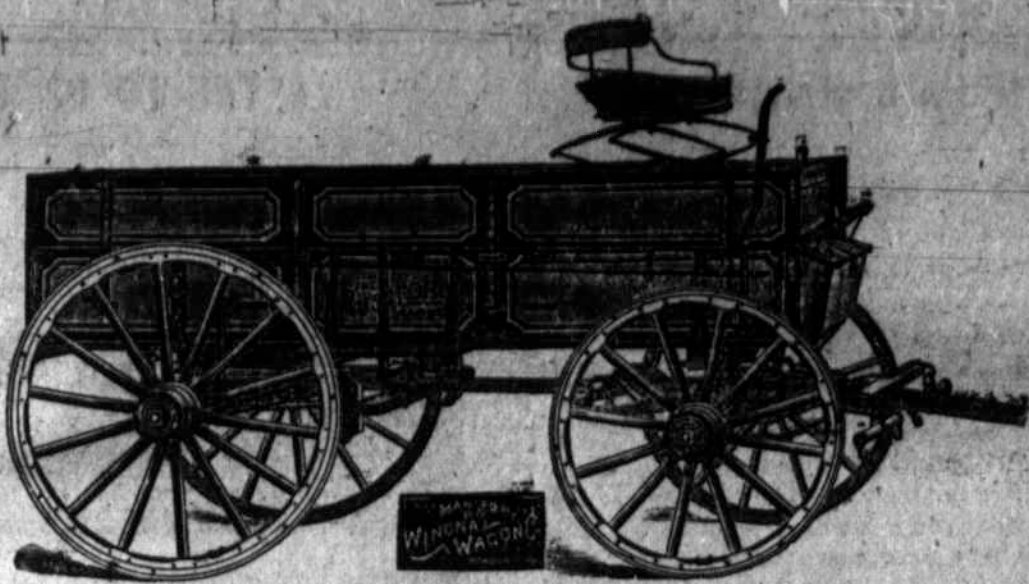
United States Senator C. W.
