Notice is hereby given that the undersigned, Street Commissioner of the city of Newberg, Yamhill county, Oregon, will receive bids for grading First street

in said city from Main street east to Center street, said street to be graded according to the established grade thereof and according to the resolution passed by the council of said city of Newberg, May 18, 1903, providing for the time and manner of grading said portion of said street, and for letting contracts thereof. Bids will be received up to Saturday, June 6, 1903, at the hour of 1 o'clock p. m. The contractor will be required to enter into a contract to do said work, and that no bid will be received after 1 o'clock June 6, 1903, and that the city of Newberg reserves the right to reject any and all bids. The bids must state the amount for which the said party submitting the same will grade the said portion of said street for: First, for completing the grade with a curb, as provided in said resolution; and secondly, without the curb as provided therein. The bids must be enclosed in an envelope, sealed and delivered to the Street Commissioner, who shall open the same at the time specified in said notice before the Recorder or Mayor.
