C. F. Mackie and daughter, Elsie, went down to Portland last week and made the purchase of a new piano. One good turn deserved another, and this week the family is riding around in a new carriage.

Van Leavitt played ball in Oregon City Sunday with the Dayton team and was reported in the Oregonian as the star of the game. An excursion went down on the river, which some Newbergers took in.

The annual meeting of the Yamhill County Pioneer Association will be held at McMinnville next Wednesday, June 3. It is announced that should the weather be unfavorable to outdoor exercises, the program will be carried out in the court house.

D. M. Sivyver came near going up in smoke Sunday. He had been bothered with exzema on the head, and to check it had made a liberal application of coal oil, which circulated pretty freely through his hair and beard. On lighting up to take a smoke, spontaneous combustion took place, and before the flames could be extinguished, Mr. Sivyver was minus hair and beard and suffered some severe burns in the bargain.

The people of this place were surprised Thursday at the news of the death of Calvin Dixon, who moved with his wife from here to Noble, Marion county, a few months ago. He came in to the house from work Monday and complained of not feeling well. From then until Thursday he remained about the house, when he died suddenly of heart trouble. The widow and daughter, Mrs. C. C. Elliott, brought the remains to Newberg, where they were interred Saturday forenoon. The funeral services were conducted at the Friends church by President McGrew.

Dr. Woods Hutchinson of Portland, secretary of the state board of health, returned the first of the week from San Francisco, where he went to study the bubonic plague situation, and gives an interesting interview in Tuesday's Oregonian relative to his observations. When in the Philippines, Dr. Harry Littlefield of this place fought the black death for months among the Filipinos, was himself a victim of the scourge, and tells a thrilling story of his experiences, which is not unlike the accounts we read of the raging of the plague throughout Europe in the middle ages. He says he sincerely hopes to be spared any such experiences in the future.

W. E. Wight left Thursday morning for Nome to resume search for the yellow metal.

The Newberg Pressed Brick & Terra Cotta Company has about fifteen hundred dollars worth of new machinery on the road from Galesburg, Illinois. It consists principally of a machine called a dry pan, weighing fifteen tons, the function of which is to grind up the white clay as soon as it is received from the factory, instead of having it stored in the same condition as received. It is expected to be a great labor and money saver.

M. D. Jones of Chehalis mountain was in town the first of the week claiming the distinction of having a broken neck. When carpentering several days ago he fell from a ladder, turned a couple of somersaults on the way down, lighting on his neck and shoulders. His vertebra at the base of the neck was unjointed by the fall, and the dislocation can be plainly felt. He seems to suffer no serious consequences.

Senator Fulton Speaks for Mr. Hermann.

Senator C. W. Fulton made a telling political address in Crater's hall Wednesday evening, and made it to a large audience. He paid a glowing eulogy to the late Mr. Tongue, but said our duty is to the living and not to the dead, and dwelt upon present needs from a political standpoint. He painted the picture of the democratic party as the party of exploded theories, the last of which is that Mr. Hermann is out of touch with the Administration. President Roosevelt has shown this charge to be utterly false, and this theory has fortunately been exploded before it hurt anybody. The speaker ridiculed the democrats for their apparent sudden consideration for a republican executive.

Mr. Fulton referred sarcastically to Reames' plea for election on the ground that the republicans would be in the majority anyway, and he couldn't hurt anything. The senator admitted that that was an advanced step for a democrat to take, but declared that Oregon wants a man who not only will not do any hurt, but that will do some good. He held that, from both a local and national standpoint, Oregonians should support Mr. Hermann, as it stands to reason that a man in harmony with the working majority of congress can accomplish more than could a member of the minority.

Senator Fulton holds that there is no immediate need of tariff revision, as the cry that protection is father of the trusts is untrue. Free trade England has trusts the same as we have. As a result of republican legislation, such trusts as the Northern Securities Co. and the

salt and beef trusts have already been enjoined.

The speaker called up some of the ghosts of democratic disaster and made a special appeal to the young men to ally themselves with the party of progress and prosperity.

Woodman Carnival at Dallas.

Commencing on June 3rd and ending on the night of the 6th, the Woodmen of Dallas will give a four days' carnival, which, from all accounts, bids fair to eclipse anything of the kind ever given on the west side of the river. At an immense cost they have secured as their prime attraction E. J. Arnold's splendid aggregation of shows, combining under several mammoth tents all the features ever presented in the large street carnivals, and to which he has also added a splendid menagerie of wild animals, a giant Ferris wheel, merry-go-round and so forth. Besides Mr. Arnold's attractions, the Woodmen will have plenty of their own, thus giving a continuous round of amusement. A carnival queen has been elected, and she and her retinue will see that there is fun unlimited. Women of Woodcraft have charge of the first day, and their team drills for large prizes will be a special feature. The uniform rank of the Woodmen will meet on the second day and also furnish many drills. Friday there will be a balloon ascension and baby show. Saturday the pioneers of Polk county will have their reunion. A special motor will run from McMinnville to Dallas each morning and evening. The Woodmen of Portland will run an excursion up on the Yamhill division on June 4th. Stand privileges can yet be obtained by writing to the chairman. Excellent camping facilities are offered.
