Rev. F. M. George and J. M. Wright have gone into partnership in the purchase of a forty acre prune orchard formerly owned by J. T. Osborn, in West Chehalam.

The company of forty-two German agriculturists and scientists who made an observation tour of Oregon this week, stopped off at Dundee Tuesday and inspected the largest prune orchard in the world.

Hermann Elected.

Though the vote throughout the First Congressional District was but two-thirds that usually polled, Binger Hermann, the republican candidate, was elected by the comfortable majority of about 2400 votes. This majority is fully as good, or a little better, than had been estimated, and shows that the voters of the First District know their interests and are not easily beguiled by chaff and hot air.

Mr. Hermann is not without honor even in his own county, as Douglas rolled up a majority for him of nearly 500. The same may be said of Reames to a less degree, as his county, Jackson, gave him 150 majority. Clackamas and Polk, usually strongly republican, jumped the track for Reames. Approximate totals of the vote are as follows: Hermann, republican, 12,581; Reames, democrat, 9297; Ingle, socialist, 1163; Elmore, prohibitionist, 748.

The counties going for Hermann, and approximate majorities, are: Benton 93, Coos 400, Curry 125, Douglas 486, Klamath 123, Lake 171, Lane 350, Linn 88, Marion 150, Tillamook 350, Washington 387, Yamhill 54. For Reames, Clackamas 252, Jackson 150, Josephine 175, Polk 81.

Locally, the two Newberg precincts gave Hermann 88 majority, the vote being as follows: North Newberg, Hermann 85, Reames 30, Elmore 29, Ingle 11; South Newberg, Hermann 61, Elmore 29, Reames 25, Ingle 5. Yamhill is a democratic county until the returns are in from the Newberg precincts.
