AFTERMATH.

Express Company Makes Demands Upon Agent Satchwell.

Station Agent H. R. Satchwell received a letter from the express company a few days ago stating that their route agent, who investigated the robbery committed here last winter, when an express package for the Chehalis Valley Mills containing \$1180 was stolen from the safe, had reported Mr. Satchwell guilty of carelessness, and that the company would accordingly hold him or the surety company which went on his bonds for the amount. The verdict and the demand were considered unjust here by those acquainted with the circumstances of the case, and a petition was quietly circulated among the business men of Newberg asking the company to reconsider the matter. A company of citizens, consisting of A. C. Churchill, N. C. Christenson, Jesse Edwards, C. J. Edwards, J. C. Porter, C. D. Pool and Rev. H. Gould, went down to the city Tuesday morning to interview the officers of the express company in Mr. Satchwell's behalf. The officers stated that they considered their agent here careless, in that, against orders, he left money in the safe. On the other hand, Mr. Satchwell holds that he did the best he could, considering that the banks were closed, that he couldn't find the officers of the C. V. Mills to deliver the package to, and that it was too bulky and weighty for him to carry about with him, and refuses to make good the amount lost. The delegation was given courteous attention, and the case will be laid before the head officer of the company at San Francisco for settlement. The people of Newberg and vicinity sincerely trust that the troublesome complication will be adjusted favorably to Mr. Satchwell.
