SANG IN CHOIR FIFTY YEARS.



Perhaps the oldest members of any church choir are John Z. Iobst and his wife, of Emaus, Pa. Mr. Iobst has been a member of the choir in the Moravian Church for an uninterrupted period of fifty-seven years. Mrs. Iobst has belonged to the same choir for fifty-two years, and sings as excellent a mezzo contralto to-day as ever. Their daughter, Mrs. William Jarrett, is the leading soprano, and Mr. Jarrett the director of the same choir.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Iobst are of families of musical fame, and their genius is natural. Frederick Iobst, father of John Z. Iobst, toured the South before the war with his two sons, John and Henry, who were then mere boys, giving concerts and winning for themselves fame and fortune. John Glering, father of Mrs. Iobst, was the organist in the Moravian Church at Emaus for forty years before his death.

In the near future the church will celebrate its one hundred and fifty-seventh anniversary, when Mr. and Mrs. Iobst will be the central figures in the program.

HERO OF THE TYROLEANS.

Andreas Hofer, One of History's Most Unique Figures.

Unique among the figures of history is that of Andreas Hofer, the hero of the Tyroleans, whose interesting personality and the scenes of whose patriotic activities are brought to mind from time to time by tourists in the mountain regions of Austria and Switzerland. As the fame of patriotic fervor and devotion to country for its people's sake burned in the breasts of some of history's notable characters, so was the zeal of this man for his native land, but his loyalty was for his sovereign instead of for his fellow men. Sympathy for the latter there was, but next to his God in this extraordinary man's heart was his Emperor and for his sake he performed those deeds which gave him fame. It was during the historical wars between France and Austria that Hofer gained fame.

He was born in the Passeyer Valley in 1765. His family kept the Inn of Sandylund, near the Passer stream; hence his frequently being called in history the Sandy Landlord. He was living at this inn, following the calling of his fathers, when, by the treaty of

Pressburg, the Tyrol was wrested from Austria and ceded to Bavaria, the ally of Napoleon. At this terrible news Andreas made a vow never again to shave his beard. During the wars his long beard, falling on his breast, gave him with the Italians the name of General Barbone. He had an athletic, well-knit frame; broad shoulders; a round, highly colored countenance; black eyes, large, brilliant and penetrating; a majestic beard; the whole breathing command, inspiring respect and attracting confidence.

Indignant at the double dealings of the Bavarian officials, Andreas had but one thought: to liberate his country from the foreign yoke, and restore it to his Emperor. With this end in view he commenced a correspondence with Archduke John. On the 16th of January, 1809, he went to Vienna with other fellow countrymen, and had several interviews with the prince, in which the plan of deliverance was definitely settled. When all was ready, Andreas returned to Saint Leonard invested with full power as commander-in-chief of the national forces. From that day his hostelry became the rendezvous of all who sighed for the deliverance of their native land. To all who could join the cause Hofer opened out his views and plans. Thrice did he drive the Bavarians from Tyrol, and this in spite of the treaties arranged between France and Austria. Some of his deeds compare with the greatest in history, almost bordering on the incredible.

On the battlefield Andreas seemed transfigured; the mild expression changed to a terrible one; he looked grand on his panting steed, his long

beard flowing in the wind, electrifying his troops with the battle-cry, "Onward for your country and your Emperor! God protects the right!" This last triumph baffles all description. The people pressed almost beneath his horse's feet; and in the intoxication of freedom they named him Dictator of the Tyrol. Hofer, regarding his wonted calm after the battle, turned his gentle glance on the excited crowd. "Do not shout, but pray," cried he. At the church of the Franciscans he dismounted and entered to give thanks to the Lord. On leaving the church the notables of the town waited on him, to express the gratitude of all the citizens. Hofer replied: "By my beard and by St. George, the Savior of our country was God himself!" Soon after, however, the peace of Vienna forced Austria once more to renounce the Tyrol. The Archduke John himself wrote to Hofer and ordered him to lay down his arms. In vain Hofer tried for a third and last time to raise an army and drive the hated Bavarians from his beloved fatherland. A price was put on his head, and a wretch named Raffi betrayed his retreat, in which he had been living some months with his family. He took leave of his companions in arms and wound up with these words:

"Farewell, most despicable world! for a brave man death is of such small account that in leaving you I have not one fear or regret!"

It was by order of Napoleon that he was shot at Mantua Feb. 20, 1810. The house in which he dwelt, where he entertained travelers and where relics of him are still preserved is annually visited by hundreds of tourists.

RELIC OF 'GENE FIELD'S GRANDFATHER

An interesting relic of the family of the late Eugene Field may be brought to Chicago if the present intentions of Mrs. Eugene Field are carried out. The relic consists of a little building in Fayetteville, Vt., which was used by General Martin Field, grandfather of the poet and humorist, as a law office nearly a century ago. The house was originally built at Newfane, Vt., but about twenty-five years ago it was removed to Fayetteville, where it has since stood in the yard of the old Field homestead in that place. The building itself is a one-story structure, made of hardwood timbers, hewn on Newfane Hill, and the supposed date of its construction is 1800. It has a pretty colonial front, with three col-

umns, and there are two rooms. The proposal which Mrs. Field is now considering is to have the little house taken apart, the logs transported to Chicago, and then have them put together again in their original form on the lawn of Eugene Field's old home.
