Miss Julia Minchin died at her home, above Dundee, Wednesday evening, from hasty consumption, the funeral to be held this (Friday) afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Minchin home. The deceased was a young woman of excellent Christian character, and her death is mourned by all who knew her.

Sam Cummins of McMinnville drove up to the watering trough in front of the Bank of Newberg, Wednesday, to water his horse and removed the bridle in order to make it easy for the cayuse. A pretty fair-sized runaway was the result. Sam was bruised up some, but was able to get horse and buggy together and drive off again.

J. D. Pickett and wife of Maysville, Missouri, are stopping a few days in Newberg on their way home from the national encampment of the G. A. R. at San Francisco. Mr. Pickett is a brother of Mrs. C. A. Marr and Mrs. Ruth Heston and served his country for over three years in the Seventeenth Iowa Veteran Volunteer Infantry.

S. J. Madson got home from Creswell, Lane county, Tuesday, where he went to look after his farming interests and to do a little hunting in the meantime. He brought down a big bear that had been devouring numbers of chickens and lambs for the ranchers and making life miserable for all the nervous women and children of the community.

Fred Knapp of Champoege, accompanied by his son-in-law and little boy, went through town Thursday on his way to North Yamhill and stopped at the Graphic office on business. They continued their journey, and at noon stopped at Trullinger's mill. Mr. Knapp led one of the horses down to a stream to drink, when the animal got into soft ground and floundered around, and kicked the man on the head, stunning him and sending him into the water when he was drowned. The body was taken back to Champoege at once.

Miss Lillie Heacock has gone out to Dolph, Tillamook county, to make some improvements upon her homestead claim.

The prune crop throughout the valley promises to be abundant and the fruit appears to be ripening early. There is some indication of the brown rot, and if climatic conditions continue to be favorable for the development of this disease, it is likely that it will give growers considerable anxiety and trouble. The Sugar prune, of which there has been so much said in the way of favorable comment in the last year or two, is now ripe, and though it is a great bearer, it shows a weakness for the brown rot that is not encouraging to growers. Those who have evaporators are rapidly putting them in order, some by enlarging and refitting throughout, and before many days the air will be laden with the sweet-smelling steam arising from the drying product of the various plants in the community.

The bathers and spectators at Nye creek beach near Newport beheld a sad affair Friday forenoon when one of the bathers, a young man from Portland named Kleeman, who had ventured out beyond the breakers, could not get back, and went down within view of hundreds of horrified people. When the unfortunate young man first gave signs of distress, two or three swimmers went to his rescue, but he clutched at them convulsively, making it necessary for them to leave him or go down too. A rope was secured and a strong swimmer again started to the rescue, but the line was too short, and the rescuer did not dare go out without it as the tide was turning and the undercurrent treacherous. The writer witnessed the tragedy with a glass from the bluff by the side of Dr. Minthorn's sanatorium, and the frantic and helpless struggles of the drowning man as he gradually sank beneath the waters, were sickening to behold. The young man's mother and sister were on the beach and their anguish can be imagined. The body was recovered at low tide early next morning near where he had gone down and lodged in a reef of rocks. This is said to be the first drowning which ever took place on the Nye creek beach.

DISASTROUS FIRE.

W. C. Kruger's Residence Goes Up in Flames.

At the hour of six o'clock on Thursday evening of last week fire was discovered in the garret over the kitchen in W. C. Kruger's residence near the railroad track in the west part of town. The alarm was given, the fire bell sounded and the hose company and the hook and ladder boys responded promptly, but alas, the nearest hydrant was so far away that the fire could not be reached with the hose and the flames had gained such headway that it seemed nothing could be done to stop its ravages, and attention was directed toward saving the furniture. The greater part of the furniture and bedding was taken out, although a good many valuables, including Mr. Kruger's notes and papers were destroyed. With a hundred feet more of hose at hand

the building could easily have been saved with but little loss and with this fact staring the fire companies in the face it was with much chagrin that they were compelled to stand by and see a handsome residence go up in flames. Mr. Kruger figures his loss at something more than \$3500 with insurance amounting to \$1700. He had always guarded his papers carefully and had only taken the box containing them from the bank vault a day or two before to look them over, expecting to return the box to the vault, but being detained about the house that evening until after banking hours failed to get it attended to. He says he thinks that with hard work he can get his accounts in shape again and the least the public can do for him is to help him in every way possible in doing this. He favored many customers while in business by giving them credit and now certainly no one will want to take advantage of his adversity. Just as soon as he can get matters adjusted he intends to build and begin over again.
