James A. Barrie, Deceased.

James Armstrong Barrie, who had been steadily weakening for two three years until he had become helpless, died Saturday, October 10th, at the age of seventy-seven years, at the home of his brother, Chas. H. Barrie. The funeral services were held at the home Monday afternoon and were in charge of Rev. Thos. Armstrong, pastor of the Friends church, the Masonic lodge, of which order he had been a member for fifty years, conducting the burial services at the cemetery.

The deceased was born at Sacketts Harbor, Jefferson county, New York, January 21st, 1826, and was the eldest of five children of which three survive him—Catherine M. Lashier, late of Newberg but now of Seattle, Washington, Wm. Barrie of Sauk Centre, Minnesota, and Chas. H. Barrie of Newberg. In 1851 the family moved to Columbus, Wisconsin, and three years later he moved to Winona, Minnesota, where he opened a merchant tailoring establishment and was actively engaged until 1890, when on account of failing health he came to Newberg where he continued in business until 1898.

Mr. Barrie was married March 4th, 1872, to Miss Emma G. Carrier of Rochester, Minnesota, who lived but two years to bless his life.

He was a man of broad mind and a kind heart, ever willing to help those in trouble or distress. He was converted here a few years ago under the preaching of President Thomas Newlin, and joined the Friends church, since which time his life of faithfulness and devotion has been an inspiration to both old and young. In his pitiable condition of utter helplessness, death came as a welcome liberator.
