years.

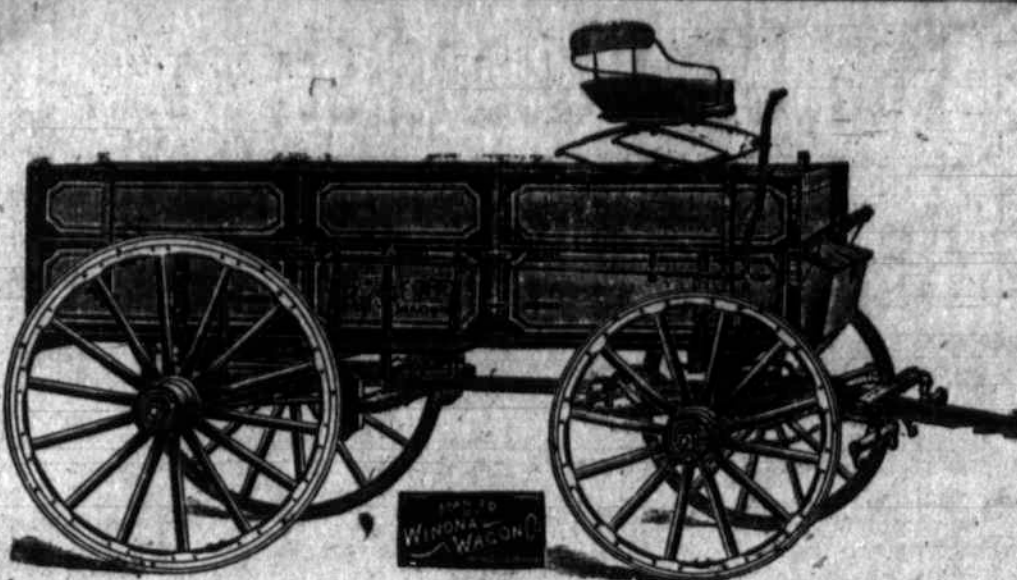
Miss Lillian Heacock returned

Prof. R. W. Kirk thinks that
public school statistics indicate
that Newberg is not getting its
share of eastern immigration.
To satisfy his own curiosity in
the matter he has made a little
investigation which shows up an
unexpected condition. He finds
that there are forty-four pupils
who have not before attended
school in Newberg, and that all
but ten of these came from some
other place in Oregon. In an at-
tendance of three hundred and
twenty-five children, the presence
of but ten from other states does
not show up a very heavy immi-
gration, considering the active
work along this line on the part
of the railroad companies. The
result but confirms the position
which has long been taken by
the Graphic—that Newberg is
losing every day in this respect
because of the poor transporta-
tion facilities between here and
Portland. When people are out
in a hurried tour of the state
they naturally go where they
can make easy and quick connec-
tions, and at present Newberg
isn't one of these places. What
we need is a morning train out
from Portland and an evening
train in.
