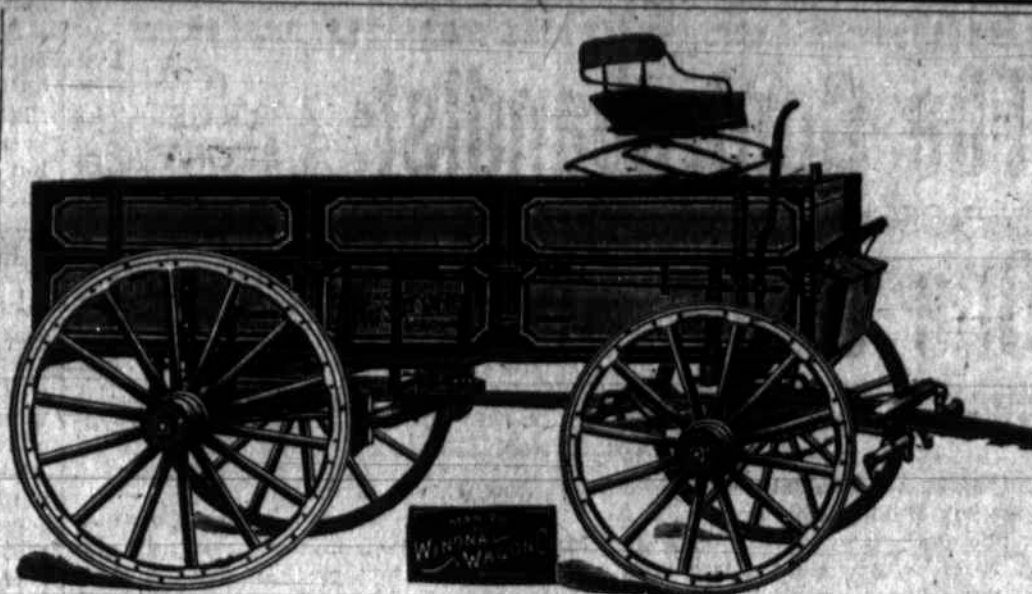

EDMUND VANCE COOKE.

Something of His Work as an Author and Entertainer.

In Edmund Vance Cooke Newberg will have something entirely above the ordinary in the way of public entertainment. Those who have handled his entertainments in the principal cities of the West, say with one accord that he is the greatest attraction in his line of work that ever came their way. He is more than a mere reader and impersonator. He is an author and a poet of no mean ability and reproduces his own writings. Proved greatness of muscle and mind and heart.
"What a grand old country it is!" I cried,

Shone bright beyond. But a strange new mark
Was over the gate, viz: "Private Park."
"Why, what is the meaning of this?" I cried,
And a saint with a livery on replied,
"It's Morgan's."

I went to the only place left. "I'll take
A chance in the boat on the brimstone lake,
Or perhaps I may be allowed to sit
On the griddled floor of the bottomless pit."
But a leering lout with horns on his face
Cried out, as he forked me off the place,
"It's Morgan's."
