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### Popularity and Success.

"When a man spends time trying not to make enemies he hasn't any left to attend to business." This pungent remark of a present day writer and philosopher, is a whole lecture on success, boiled down until it is strong enough to attract attention and conviction. It is worthy the attention of every young man.

The terms popularity and success are placed in the wrong relation in the popular mind. The general idea is, that to be popular is to be successful; to be successful is to be popular. At least it certainly tends in this direction.

What is success? Being liked by everybody? Or is it found in doing things? If it is found in the answer to the first question, it can rarely be found in the answer to the second, for he who is aggressive, who is a positive factor, who pushes to the front and gets things done, generally leaves a string of little fellows in his wake, snarling and snapping at his heels. Must he stop to pet and pacify them? Not according to the dictum, "Never apologize, never explain, never retract—get the thing done and let them howl."

When you find the man "who hasn't an enemy in the world" you generally find one who hasn't done enough to deserve one. There are very rare exceptions to this rule, for there is one man in ten thousand who has the tact both to do and to please. But as you can't reasonably hope to do both, it is certainly better to do than to please. This doesn't advocate a pugnacious, devil-may-care attitude at all. Be considerate, though positive. Don't make an enemy if you can help it, for you will make enough when you can't help it.

A man who starts out to please everybody has undertaken the hardest job he could have found. If he succeeds, he is a failure, paradoxical as this may appear.

"An habitation giddy and unsure Hath he that buildeth on the vulgar heart." There are worse things than an enemy who appreciates your strength.

Old Gorgon Graham, the pork packer philosopher, in a letter to his son, has this paragraph, on the subject of trying to please everybody:

"You can't step out in any direction without treading on somebody's corns, but unless you keep moving, the fellow who's in a hurry to get somewhere is going to fetch up on your bunion. Some men are going to hate you because you're smooth, and others because you have a brutal way of telling the truth. You're going to repel some because they think you're cold, and others will cross the street when they see you coming because they think you slop over. One fellow don't like you because you've got curly hair, and another will size you up as a stiff because you're bald. Whatever line of conduct you adopt you're bound to make enemies, but so long as there's a choice, I want you to make

yours by being straightforward and just. You'll have the satisfaction of knowing that every enemy you make by doing the square thing is a rascal at heart. Don't fear too much the enemy you make by saying No, nor trust too much the friend you make by saying Yes."

In other words, don't hesitate to do a thing that ought to be done and which you ought to do, for fear of displeasing somebody. It's better to have your own respect, than to hate yourself for a coward, though you pass for a good fellow whom everybody likes.

### Election Results.

Tuesday's elections brought a few surprises, though the results in general had been pretty well foretold.

Tammany won in New York, McClellan defeating Low for mayor by over 60,000 majority.

The three cornered municipal fight in San Francisco was won by the Labor ticket, Schmitz being re-elected mayor.

Ohio went overwhelmingly republican, by the greatest victory in the history of the state with one exception. The result is a complete victory for Senator Hanna.

Republican victories are also recorded in Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Nebraska, Iowa and Colorado.

Kentucky democrats re-elected Beckham for governor, and Rhode Island probably re-elected its democratic governor.

### State W. C. T. U. Convention.

The twenty-first annual convention of the State Woman's Christian Temperance Union held in Salem October 20 to 23 was one of the best and by far the most largely attended of any ever held in the state. State President Mrs. Harford delivered a masterful address in which she reviewed the work and progress of the Union since it was founded more than thirty years ago, when only twelve states were represented. Now the work has extended to every state in the Union, as well as to the islands of the seas. Mrs. Harford urged that the state establish headquarters in Portland before the coming of the Lewis and Clark exposition.

Reports show a total membership of 2000 in the state, a gain of 300 over last year.

A delegate from Union county traveled twenty-four hours at a cost of twenty-five dollars, one fare, to attend the convention.

Miss Phelps of Canada, a lecturer of rare ability, was in attendance at the convention. Newberg may have the opportunity of hearing her in the near future. Six hundred and one boys have signed the anti-cigarette pledge.

Mrs. Louisa Round has distributed 10,116 pages of literature in the mercy department.

The grand gold medal contest on the last evening was participated in by six speakers representing five counties in the state. The medal was awarded to Miss Marian Hubbell of Portland, the subject of whose splendid oration was "Christian Citizenship."
