If, as it appears, Ex-Congressman Moody is being persecuted as well as prosecuted, he will lose nothing by the trumped up charge against him. His enemies have taken the best means for securing his political re-instatement in Oregon.

Dr. Minthorn made a statement in public a few days ago which is worth considering. He said that now is the first time in the history of Newberg when every man can sell out to advantage if he wishes. He held that it was an indication of a future of unprecedented growth and development, and he was undoubtedly correct.

Fifteen years ago Newberg was having what might have been termed a boom. As recorded in a news note on the first page, fifty-three dwellings and business houses went up inside of six months. The rapid and steady growth continued until the hard times came on, when it slackened up, since when it has been more gradual. This year however is the best in Newberg's history. It reminds one of the growth of fifteen years ago, except that it is a much more substantial growth. Probably not more than about half of the recorded fifty-three buildings have been built this season, but a far greater amount of money has been expended. The average dwelling erected this year, would build two or three of those erected fifteen years ago. It will not take many such years of development as this has been, to make of Newberg a city.
