The arrangement of some details, awaiting which the free switch proposition has been hung up for some little time, has been made, and the much longed-for enterprise is now assured. The committee in charge yet lacks three hundred dollars, in round numbers, of the necessary amount to be raised, but feels confident that the public, once assured that the switch is to be put in, will rally with this little sum. Accordingly operations are to be begun at once. The committee on construction, J. C. Hodson, Dr. H. B. Clough and F. A. Morris, has met and matured plans for beginning work. Roy Burke, an experienced railroad man, has been appointed as chief of construction, and work on the new switch is expected to begin within a few days.

Carl was on the road of the new line a few days ago running southeast from Portland, out through Clackamas county, and came home more thoroughly imbued than ever with the idea that Newberg people should bestir themselves for a like enterprise. He says it is wonderful, the influence the electric line has already had in developing the country it penetrates. He has talked with parties closely associated with the owners of the Oregon City line, who say that the company will extend the line in this direction, if the people will let their wants be known, and assure the company that the business is here. Mr. Carl thinks the line could be secured within a year if the citizens of Newberg, Dayton, McMinnville and other points would unite in the right kind of effort.
