Important Announcement.

The date of Tuesday, January 12th, will be a red letter day in Newberg; for it is at that time that the world famous Fisk Jubilee Singers will give their entertainment here.

But a date just as important for citizens to remember is that of January 5th, for on the morning of that day, Tuesday, one week before the entertainment, the reserved seat plats will be opened at both drug stores. Let this be understood by all. Remember the rush for the Knox-Kantuer entertainment and be in time to get a reserved seat, for if you fail the first time you fail entirely as there will be no second appearance here by the Fisk singers. There are but two hundred reserved seats, and they will be sold to the first who apply for them on Tuesday morning.

At most places where the Fisk Jubilee Singers appear, the prices of seats are at least one dollar, and general admission seventy-five cents, but reserved seats here will be sold for fifty cents, general admission thirty-five cents. Benches will be placed in front which may be occupied by children twelve years and under for twenty-five cents. The management has placed the price of seats as low as possible to come out whole. The company costs one hundred dollars, and with all other expenses, the hall will have to be well filled at these rates or money will be lost on the venture.

If you want to be convinced that you should hear this concert, just talk one minute with somebody who has heard the Jubilee Singers. One citizen who has heard them at different times in the East, says he will hear them though the price be raised four times in place of once.

Says a prominent Eastern journal, "It never makes any difference what the weather is, people always go in battalions to listen to the sweet, wild slave songs of the South, and the pieces the best known and the oldest, such as, 'Swing Low, Sweet Chariot,' 'Gideon's Band,' 'Keep Me from Sinking Down,' and 'I'm Rolling through an Unfriendly World,' are the ones which provoke the loudest and longest applause, for they touch the hearts of the listeners, who seem to catch the enthusiasm and excitement of the wild rhapsody, and to forget everything else. For the moment everything is shut out from the mental vision except the picture of rice and cotton fields and the dusky nation in their humble cabins singing the songs which are now the property of the world."

If Newberg people wish to hear the best they will certainly be willing to pay fifteen cents more for it than for the common run of "eloquutionary entertainments." September 15—In one day, 2 seconds slow.
September 18—In three days, 7 seconds slow.
September 21—In three days, 4 seconds slow.
September 28—In one week, 1 second slow.
October 5—In one week, 3½ seconds fast.
October 10—In five days, 1 second slow.
December 4—In 55 days, off 5 seconds (slow). Did not change; could not believe time came right.
December 18—Got time straight from Lick Observatory—not changed since October 10. Found clock one-half second slow.
